Whether you choose to call him "CASSIUS CLAY" or "MUHAMMAD ALI", you'll have to agree this great fighter is, indisputably, the King of the Boxing World. Displaying his matchless skill and ability to millions of fight fans throughout the nation via radio and closed television circuit, and abroad through the EARLY BIRD SATELLITE, as well as, in person, before upwards of 40,000 roaring spectators in Houston, Texas, the Heavyweight Champion of the World was just as beautiful to watch as is the famed Astrodome Stadium in which the fight was staged.

The Champ said of his next opponent, ERN-EST TERRELL, whom he is scheduled to meet some time in February, that he thinks he will punish him unmercifully rather than knocking him out quickly since TERRELL had "talked himself' into the role of a lamb to be slaughtered for the New Year.

Now fans, both here and abroad, have joined the believers...It is being remarked that Champion CLAY has hung the rabbit, PATTER-SON, destroyed the "Bear" twice, minced the challenger, MILDENBERGER, bombarded the Englishman, LONDON, and blinded his countryman, HENRY COOPER, and massacred the Canadian, CHUVALO, and in reviewing the situation, the reluctant admission is "This American" must be the greatest fighter who ever stepped into the ring.
