BONERS IN THE NEWS. By Juliet Lowell, Illustrations by Richard Bennett, New York: Pocket Books, Inc., \$1. Lively and laughable are the newspaper blunders in this hilarious collection. Juliet Lowell has added another of her list of 10 best-selling books which include **DUMBELLES LETTERS, DEAR SIR, DEAR MR. CONGRESSMAN, DEAR MAN OF AFFAIRS, and DEAR DOCTOR.**

A prolific journalist, she has been a newspaper columnist, and has contributed articles to numerous magazines and newspapers. She also wrote an article for the Encyclopedia Britannica on War Humor, and is currently at work on three new books, **FROM BED TO WORSE, IT STRIKES ME FUNNY,** and an autobiography entitled **DEAR ME.**

Typical of the blunder in **BONERS IN THE NEWS** are these two:

"NEW YORK HERALD TRIBUNE--A large night-blooming Cereus Plant, owned by Mrs. Thomson, put forth two large buds which bloomed last Saturday Evening. Mrs. Thomson will be glad to show her night bloomers to anyone who cares to see them."

"LANCASTER DAILY EAGLE--The fire was put out before any damage was done by the local fire department."

MOJO HAND. By Jane Phillips. New York: Simon and Schuster.

Jane Phillips is 22 and talented. She is also in complete revolt against conformity, status seekers, limitations to individual freedom. Living in an atmosphere that bespeaks steady rebellion, she parades the inevitable trousers, strums the inevitable guitar, and seeks the transient adventures of a creative rebel.

MOJO HAND is a revealing description of the murky world of the blues which exist in Negro ghettos of the South.

Surprisingly, Miss Phillips is able to create the drama of a world which is entirely new to her. She had never known the world of **MOJO HAND** until she went to Raleigh, as part of the movement.

HER SKILLED descriptive writing suggests that she may be one of the very good writers of her generation. She does not write social comment, she represents life as she interprets and experiences it. And, having completed **MOJO HAND**, she is now at work on a novel which deals with an experiment in surrealism.

NAACP Regional Office Sponsors Poster Contest

The Las Vegas Branch NAACP, through its President Charles L. Kellar, announces that the Western States Conference, through the West Coast Regional Office of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, will sponsor a poster contest to select three posters which depict the NAACP as it is or has been engaged in the civil rights struggle.

THE PRIZES will be first, second and third of \$100, \$50, and \$25 savings bonds respectively. Anyone is eligible to enter a poster. Not more than three colors, including white, may be used. Posters must not be smaller than 8-1/2 x 11 inches. There is no maximum size.

The Regional Office of the NAACP will serve as judge and contest winners will be announced and prizes mailed to them. Mr. W. Martin, 948 Market Street, San Francisco, California 94102, is in charge of the contest.
