FIRST OF ALL, she was "discovered" (as it were) in Chicago after being one of the most sought-after "local" vocalists in the Midwest. No one had ever suggested that she record because, after all, she was just a "local" singer and everybody knows that "local" singers don't go anywhere!

They probably said that about Nancy Wilson, too, when she was just a "local" singer in Chillicothe, Ohio.

Anyway, record producers being the hungry-type guys that they are and knowing that bit-time stardom for many entertainers nowadays is just around the corner--or somebody in Chicago heard her and flipped. He told somebody else and they, in turn, got the word to Bobby

Miller, one of the top talent-finders in America.

BOBBY WAS, at the time, working for Mercury Records as a producer. When he tried to get the big wigs to sign her--without even hearing her--they nixed the idea, and reportedly, Miller packed up and left. He has been working with Jerry Butler and Jerry Ross, who produced Bobby Hebb's "Sunny."

Word gets around fast! Record men are like broken refrigerators--they can't keep anything! Carl Davis heard about her; Ronnie Granger heard about her; Larry Maxwell heard about her... and the next thing you know she's in New York as the personal guest of Johnny Nash... and his wife, Margaret!

Not one, but five companies have tendered conditional contracts and, bless her sweet heart, she isn't rushing into anything. She reminds me

of a carbon copy of businesswoman Nancy Wilson. She, incidentally, doesn't sound like Nancy at all.

HER PERSONAL Manager, Sam Phillips, reports that Barbara "sounds like a mixture of Aretha Franklin and Della Reese." There is simply too much soul there and it can't be contained. Naturally, everybody can compare her voice to anybody they really like.

She does have a "thing" all her own, though, and it is this little extra something that puts her head and shoulders above most of the performing artists of today. You'll see this is true once we get the recording business out of the way and she is given national exposure she so richly deserves.

As was mentioned here some weeks ago, Barbara Rinehart's on her way.

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
