TAKE ONE vocal genius, add a heaping portion of acting talent, a sprinkling of mystery, the agility and grace of a ballerina and a lot of soul, and the result is a kind of female Sammy Davis, Jr.: the inimitable Eartha Kitt.

Miss Kitt, nominated for an Emmy last year for her incomparable "I Spy" performance as a narcotics addict, will wriggle her way through a labyrinth of ventilating ducts in a Russian embassy for a "Mission Impossible" segment titled "The Traitor," to be aired on CBS-TV Saturday, April 15.

As a dancer, Eartha has appeared before England's royal family. As a singer, she's warbled in Haitian, African and Cuban. As one of the world's most exciting women, she's been praised in Paris, Belgium, Switzerland, Turkey, Greece, Egypt and, far from being the least important, in the infamous section of Los Angeles called Watts.

IT WAS regarding her association with the latter community that I spoke with the vivacious entertainer at her tasteful and intimate Bel Air home recently. For Eartha has taken time from her already gargantuan schedule to establish and supervise a free dancing school in Watts.

After I first thought of the class," enthused Eartha, "I called Lou Robinson, West Coast Editor for Johnson Publications, on Saturday. He put me in touch with the well-known Westminster House in Watts on the following Tuesday. The first classes started on that next Saturday.'

In a few short weeks, enrollment grew to such proportions that Eartha took on three assistants--dancers Walter Painter and Claude Thompson, and Marjorie Mead, a housewife. "I didn't want to choose which kids should stay; I want them all and I won't reject any. Of course, I may have to change the class from two to four hours or have it meet twice a week.

But what of the time and money Eartha is

giving up to instruct the class?

"I honestly don't think of that," she says. "I'm not giving up anything. I'm involved in something I want to do and feel I must do. I work hard as an entertainer and I'd be the first to admit I make a good living, but I certainly don't have to spend every minute of my life making a dollar.

"ALSO, IT'S NOT my purpose to create great dancers from these kids. More than anything else, the class helps them evolve and progress as human beings. They get love and affection -and a sense of accomplishment and worth.'

The results of Miss Kitt's efforts have already been deeply felt. An adhesive loyalty has grown among Eartha's assistants and the mothers of the young dancers. While the star was away in Houston on tour, Marjorie Mead took to the Los Angeles freeways in some of the worst rain in the state's history to keep the class

The children's mothers have named the youngsters The Eartha Kitt Dancettes. The mothers call themselves The Eartha Kitt Dancettes' Mothers. Eartha has also received ofers of aid from everyone from cab drivers

"So many people have wanted to help," says the entertainer, "that I might start an organization of people who want to help other people." She already has.
