"THE FUSE IS LIT"

Unheedingly, both Negroes and whites go along, ignoring the foreboding forecasts of a long, hot summer for 1967.

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., makes predictions and his critics accuse him of fomenting

riots.

Roy Wilkins points to current conditions as ingredients essential to summer riots, but when they happen, everyone will be asking: What started the riot?: Why do they burn, loot and kill?

Stokely Carmichael shouts, "burn, baby, burn" and when they burn, "he" is accused of inciting riot and we never question the fact that those who light the fires may have had a rationale of their own.

WHEN THE FIRE breaks out in Milwaukee, Wis., please find this column for a partial analysis made by a Chicago Sun-Times editorial writer in the feature section, "Viewpoint," April 23, 1967. The basic story tells of the heroic leadership of a Roman Catholic Priest, Father James E. Groppi. Here is what writer D.J.R. Bruckner says:

"What is happening in Milwaukee seems a

"What is happening in Milwaukee seems a repetition of so many sad stories, as Fr. Groppi and his Youth council produced an issue (Aug. 1966 demonstrations) which literally disturbed the peace of the community, his vociferous and extreme enemies started a campaign against him.

him. "The response to that campaign by officials and common people alike has been to criticize both sides, but the net effect has been a total movement of the community against the rights movement and a total increase in racial anxiety."

These then are the steps:

 Mobilization and demonstration by Negroes and liberal whites.

2. Violent reaction by white bigots.

Organized movements, political and otherwise, against civil rights activity.

4. Racial anxiety in the Negro ghetto.

5. RIOTS!

WE COMMEND Fr. Groppi and join in his statements relative to the church, particularly when he states, "This question of civil rights will make or break Christianity in the United States."

Fr. Groppi adds "It seems to me, the survival of this church (St. Boniface, Milwaukee) and the whole Christian church, and of this country and others, and of myself and the black people and the whites, is at stake."

Indeed, inherent in the very nature of the church is the vital ingredient that would prevent the burning of our cities, but the only fire the church notices is the alleged fire of an afterdeath hell.

Whenever I read of a minister, Negro or white, who condemns marches, demonstrations, or urgent insistence for the rights of Negroes, I know that he holds in his own hand the match to light the fuse.
