Added "Color" Makes Squad Top Team



GULF OIL'S GIANTS--"I'm surrounded by giants," Gulf Oil Corporation All-Star Coach Jim McGregor says to the cameraman. the Gulf Stars trip.) Other players on the Gulf team include Steve Thomas, twice an All-America at Xavier University, and Curt Gammell, an NAIA All-America from Pacific Lutheran.

Keeping such players eligible for international amateur competition while permitting them to stay in good shape is a major reason for the Gulf All-Stars team.

"Although we have been winning the Olympics competition," Coach McGregor said, "the lack of an adequate pool of competent, well-prepared basketball players in the years between the Games has led to defeat in the World Basketball Championships of 1950, 1958 and 1962. In 1965, the United States lost to Yugoslavia in an Invi-tational World Tournament."

McGREGOR SEES two causes for losses such as these: (1) Many world tournaments are held during the normal U.S. school year, keeping college stars out of competition; and (2) the standard of basketball around the world is im-

proving rapidly. "Gulf hopes," he said, "that by providing an opportunity to compete and gain experience in international competition for our graduating university athletes, that these players in turn will be able to make a contribution to the teams which will represent the U.S.A. in international play.
