Sincerity of speech is closely allied to simplicity, and has its roots in the principle which we have been stressing, an emphasis on essentials and a suppression of the corrupt or false.


In the interest of simplicity in our homes, we might change some of our ordinary practices which make us busy to little real profit.

RELIGION: GUILTY AS CHARGED

Religion has been charged by the Rev. Malcolm Boyd, famous night club priest of Detroit, with failing the civil rights drive.

In an interview with one of Chicago's outstanding Negro news writers--Lillian Calhoun of the Chicago Daily News--this Episcopal priest

says that the "civil rights movement has had it."

He adds that "the movement is shattered."

Rev. Boyd blames labor, along with religion, for the lack of gains in apprenticeships, jobs and open housing for Negroes.

Another indication that the rights movement is shattered, Rev. Boyd says, is that after the use of the words "black power," "the war in Vietnam," the black man in the ghetto realizes his condition is worse.

The responsibility of religion in the area of civil rights has been the major focus of this column. If the assessment of this minister, who travels all over the country, is valid, it looks as though we will have to intensify this focus.

NEGRO RELIGION is not exempt from responsibility. It cannot point to "white" religion as the sole foot-dragger in the movement.

A recent experience of mine reveals one area where Negro religion could make a contribution:

A white teenager at a meeting in which I spoke on integration, asked why don't Negro youth respond to acts of sincere goodwill directed toward them by their fellow white high school classmates?

Immediately I thought of the many opportunities Negro religious leaders have to educate and train Negro youths to ACCEPT opportunities of integration afforded them.

To be sure, there are many whites of goodwill, particularly among youth who are weary of segregation. But, they need the complement of Negro youth to join hands with them, so that together the days of racism can be terminated.

IF NEGRO religious leaders would spend less time debating the pronouncements and positions of Dr. King, Stokely Carmichael, Roy Wilkins, Whitney Young, et al., and spend time holding workshops with their youth who are not ready to accept--mentally or emotionally--the integration that is now available, this would be a meaningful "civil rights movement."

There is an Altar of Real Integration inside the door that young white America is opening. Negro youth MUST walk through that door with heads up and a hand of friendship extended.
