RECEIVING

Text: Scripture Phil. 4:14-18.

The Philippian Church sent Paul a gift, Paul received the gift most graciously calling it "an odour of a sweet smell." It was a figure of speech for fragrant. Fragrant in this connection would be itself a figure of speech. "Your gift was most fragrant," we might say. It carries the suggestion of flowers and perfume.

IT IS A very simple lesson that we may learn from this incident of giving and receiving. For once we shall not emphasize the giving, but con-

sider the importance of .gracious receiving.

Refusal or reluctance to receive from others is often an indication of pride, selfishness, and self-conceit. A wise woman psychoanalyzed herself drastically in this connection to discover why she was a "stingy receiver". Her ego resented any communication that would make her a recipient instead of a bestower. Her selfrevelation "made plain to me that my reluctance was due to self- REV. D. M. CLARK conceit, to the regret



that I could not be in the limelight as a bestower--but must lurk in the semi-shadows as a

An attitude of reluctance to receive may be unfair to a loved one or a friend. A man I know married a very wealthy woman. He himself had been very poor. It was a marriage of true love on both sides. They lived together in great happiness, except, (and this was an exception that almost broke his wife's heart) he would never accept graciously from her anything that his wife's wealth provided for his comfort or for their home.

WHEN WE refuse a favor which we cannot return, are we not depriving another of the joy of adding to the sum of human happiness? Or are we not guilty of doubting the sincerity of

the would-be giver?

There is a tremendous thrill in gracious receiving. Not only is there deep satisfaction in the thought that someone cares for us enough to give to us, there is also pleasure to be taken in the gift itself. The willingness to receive may be as much a proof of friendship as is that of giving. There is great comfort in having a friend who never doubts our love.

Don't be a stingy receiver of affection, but accept it with your whole heart.

NOT IN 100 YEARS

The timetable for the unification of 10 major Protestant denominations is set for "de facto" union within 13 years and final incorporation

Meanwhile, there is a continual falling away of young members and clergymen from major

Protestant denominations.

THE REASON was made clear by the Rev. Colin W. Williams, National Council of Churches, at the sixth meeting of the Consultation on Church Union, held in Cambridge, Mass. Rev. Colin said, "The problem for existing

Protestant institutions is catching up with their

members.

A young Catholic layman, active in civil rights, asked the other day, if I felt there was any hope for the survival of the church as an institution.

His question came out of the anguish he suffers as he views the conservative-to-inert stance of his own faith in relation to its role in

the vital social issues of the day.

While the dreamers of a vast single church, with some 25 million members, are trying to resolve such questions as the structure of the super-church, congregational organization, clerical ranking, hierarchical authority and local church board functions, those who are sensitive to such irrelevance are easing out the front door.

Will there be 25 million people to incorpor-

ate as one body 25 years from now?
TWO NEGRO denominations are included in the 10 laboring for union. One point alone that is characteristic of both is their traditional emphasis on election of bishops.


Visit either the AME or AME Zion General conference--both meet next year--and compare the money, time and energy spent in the sometimes unholy politics of electing bishops, over against the time spent in programming that would renew these denominations to the point of meaningful relevance in our segregation-scarred society, and you will see irrelevance at its

My prediction is that the 10-church union will never happen--even in 100 years. Organization, with its hierarchy and stratification of power and authority, is not what the church ought concern itself with if survival is its aim.

Worker priests-pastors, shopping-center chaplains; night club and coffee-house pastors; civil rights emissaries and peace missioners are just a few of the ministries' combined efforts of varying denominations could join in supporting-NOW!

There's an Altar called the World, into which the church ought be going to serve, rather than depending upon it for the light bill.
