GRAMBLING TAGGED AS BASEBALL HAVEN

GRAMBLING, La. - (NPI)--It might sound slightly exaggerated, but scouts representing half the teams in the American and National baseball leagues are calling the Grambling College squad a \$1 million club.

The statement will likely bring a lot of fans out of their seats with a look of incredulity that can be translated only one way: I don't believe it ... but a \$1 million tag hardly seems proper description for a team with such distinguished characteristics.

Even President-Coach R. W. W. Jones, imperturbable after 42 years on the coaching line, admits that "this club provides a special quality of excitement."

Grambling has compiled an unmatched 35-1 record this season and rates as one of the greatest collection of college players ever assembled. Their performance brings to mind Hemingway's classic description of "Grace Under Pressure." THE TIGERS won the Southwestern Athletic

Conference and NAIA area five championships by making a fetish of stinginess and frustrating rivals with tight pitching and heavy hitting.

Power hitting is the modus operandi for the north Louisiana club as every member of the starting team is hitting over .300. The team set an NAIA playoff record by hitting seven homers in one game against Frostburg State (Md.).

Grambling dominates current NAIA national statistics with a .355 team batting average and a 0.88 pitching staff earned-run-average. The Tigers have commanded unequivocal rating as the No. 1 college division team in the U.S. from the NAIA and the newspaper collegiate baseball. Second Baseman Ralph Garr has been a dramatic and relevant force in Grambling's drive. He leads the nation in hitting with a flam-boyant .585 average and 11 triples. Scouts insist that his credentials are impeccable. They analyze him as a super-star of the future. His versatility could command a bonus in the neighborhood of the \$200,000 received by Rick Reichardt from the California Angels.


Success of the tournament was made sweeter to the Doolittle staff because of the great support and interest of parents.
