The 21-year-old 5'11" 180-pound senior is not the only player whose efforts have contributed immeasurably in making Grambling a powerful baseball juggernaut. Tiger foes have also been spooked by Bob Williams (.413), John Thomas (.340), Mike Cummings (.353), Frank Patterson (.308), Ben Williams (.375), Matthew Alexander (.357), Robert Atkins (.314), Alfred Gipson (.347), and Victor Tweedle (.384). Patterson, Alexander, and the Williams boys--Ben and Bob--are outstanding bonus \$\$\$ prospects, and they are maturing fast.

Grambling is also blessed with overall pitching balance. Lefty Jimmie Jackson (11-1) is the bellweather of the staff. His ERA is 0.79 for 89 innings, and he has fanned 136 batters. Jackson has blazing speed and is blessed with a big heart and a supple arm.

Other pitchers particularly effective this season are Charles Jones (8-0), Roy Maine (7-0), and Jerry Washington (7-0).

Grambling has solid hitting, strong pitching and steady fielding. The proud haughty Tigers will not be satisfied until the NAIA National Championship pennant is flying from the flag pole in the campus quadrangle.

WASHINGTON - (NPI)--How to deal with stant sellout. Instead of performing for only mounting racial unrest? For some, the answer

lay in trying to stir up even more trouble, or using it as a threat to gain concessions. In Chicago and Washington, however, dif-ferent answers were given. Efforts were made

to turn youths into productive citizens, rather than exploiting their troubled backgrounds.

Which approach is better? The answer may come when the thermometer begins dropping in the fall. If the youths had taken advantage of their opportunities and racial temperatures had been kept cool, perhaps the efforts to help them overcome would work in other communities as well.

In Washington, singer-actress Eartha Kitt was singing "I Wanna Be Evil," a song she recorded several years ago under RCA Victor label, at a local night club. But there, the evil ended. She was working with a D.C. youth group known as Rebels With A Cause and seeking Congressional support for her endeavors. Ninety per cent of the groups' members have juvenile records.

MISS KITT, who has worked with lowerincome-area youths in Watts, approached Rep. Roman Pucinski (D-Ill.) about the idea. He agreed that support of the group was worthwhile. Rebels With A Cause might even be'a model for such groups throughout the country, he added.

The Rebels began as a volunteer group in the Anacostia area. Despite their juvenile backgrounds, they have become one of the most influential groups for betterment within Anacostia, Miss Kitt said.

In Chicago, a Woodlawn minister is working with members of the Blackstone Rangers gang, said to be the largest in the Midwest, in an effort to direct their aggressive energies toward useful goals.

The Rev. John R. Fry, First Presbyterian church, seeks to organize the gang--not for more terror and violence, but for community improvement. He is joined in his efforts by entertainer Oscar Brown, Jr., who put the Rangers to work in the production of an entertain-ment show called "Opportunity Please Knock." one weekend, as originally scheduled, the Rangers will keep on playing week after week. They've even decided to give a midnight show on Saturday nights.

The gang has gone so far as to be incorporated. According to advertisements appearing in metropolitan newspapers, the Blackstone Rangers, Inc., has been so successful in its \$ production that 75 of its members have been employed in the entertainment industry.

As a result of their talents being put to good use, their main turf in Woodlawn has become one of the most trouble-free areas on Chicago's Southside.

Meanwhile, in other cities, the predictions of summer violence kept coming.

Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., came to Cleve-land and warned of "trouble and unrest" if the city doesn't do its part. He announced he would promote "creative nonviolent action" in his efforts to organize the community. He desig-nated Cleveland as his "target city" this sum-mer. So did CORE. A possible intra-movement clash thus could be possible.


In San Francisco, the Black Panther Party for Self-Defense was organized. Its leader, Huey Newton, said he believed that "political power comes through the barrel of a gun." His organization will "strike out and will not stop until the aggressor is wiped out thoroughly, wholly, absolutely and completely.

IN NASHVILLE, Stokely Carmichael declared that "we are going to shoot the cops that are burning our black brothers." He has believed ever since he was a child that "if a white man shoots me, I should shoot him down," he declared.

## DRAFT PERCENTAGES

WASHINGTON - (NPI)--The percentage of Negro youths accepted by the draft rose from 29.2 to 42.5 per cent between 1965 and 1966. Among whites, the percentage increased from 60 to 64.
