Grand Wash has been producing limit catches on bass from 2 to 3 pounds. The Bass have been taking large waterdogs in preference to small dogs, plugs, and minnows.

Red Marion landed a big Cat in the 12 pound or more class about 10 days ago. The chances are that he has caught several more big channel cats since we last checked with him. Red caught his catfish on a waterdog.

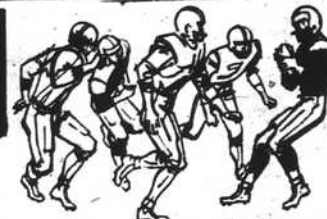
