A few years ago a minister, in company with a group of ministers, boasted that the only book he read was the Bible. Complaints heard today from laymen would indicate that many ministers' sermons reflect no further knowledge than that hidden under the dust of time in biblical literature.

There are yet, persistent in the ranks of the Christian ministry, those who believe they can read a verse from the Bible, open their mouths and words God would have the people hear; come out. The severity of our racial crisis would rule such a technique untenable.

It is heartening, however, to know that lay people do not have to depend solely upon what Rev. says on Sunday to get their gospel food.

THE FACT of the availability of books for those who want to know about the Christian religion and where it stands in today's social revolution was brought to mind once again as I read another of William Stringfellow's books--Dissenter In A Great Society.

This book is easy to read and understand. Readers, Negro and white, will soon discover while reading this book that much the Bibleonly-reading preachers are saying has nothing to say about what life is all about--what religion is all about in the Year of Our Lord, 1967.

It is evident, as one peruses this book, that this stuff that is peddled as Christianity is not very Christian.

Stringfellow, an active, profoundly incisive Episcopalian layman, who has had his own baptism in the Negro ghetto, is by any measurement one of the most theologically (and I apologize for the resemblance to former definitions of this term) informed bench members in anybody's church.

MY MAJOR point in bringing this particular book to your attention -- and I have called attention to another of his books previously--is to raise the point that it is high time that we should have church text books for church members. The educational function of the ministry and the laity is sorely lagging.

is there any reason why a minister would not, at the beginning of the church year or sea son, pass out to his congregation a list of reading material to be read, and, out of which he could bring relevant and meaningful sermons and discussions? Even the Bible would have more, relevance and meaning.

Pertinent to the racial crisis is the fact that there are a few laymen and preachers who, see-ing the irrelevancy of what we call Christianity, have dared to write about it, revealing how socalled Christians, as well as institutionalized Christianity, have sanctioned and supported racial discrimination.

We need an Altar of Well-Read Laymen to be added to those remedies essential in curing our racial sickness.
