the news-making convention, Joanne said, was the banquet speech of Miss Barbara Jordan, first Negro woman elected to the Texas State Senate since Reconstruction.

THE NEGRO woman, according to Miss Jordan, must change a "Philosophy of excuse to the philosophy of responsibility...She would ever remind the citizen...that a man of dignity does not burn down the store and beg for his supper."

Other outstanding events of the convention included a public address by Senator Charles H. Percy (R.-Ill.); a commendation from Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey on the organization's "Teen-Lift', an annual career motivation program; a panel discussion on "Trouble in Our Streets--Some Positive Approaches' moderated by Ofield Dukes, special Assistant to Vice President Humphrey and Sengstacke Publications; Howard B. Woods, editor-in-chief of the Pittsburgh Courier, and Herman T. Smith, president and chairman of the board of Jet Foods Corporation.

WORKSHOP discussions were held on education, foreign policy, employment and training and the status of women as well as six practical politics sessions. All speakers were outstanding specialists in their respective fields and brought to the delegates new insights and approaches to the problems under discussion.

Honorary members initiated during special ceremonies held on the opening day of the convention were Lady Sara Lou Carter, wife of Guyana's ambassador to the United States; Mrs. Charlotte Moton Hubbard, Deputy Assistant Secretary of the State for Public Affairs; Mrs. Fred Lazarus, III, civic leader and wife of the board chairman of Shillitos and the Federated Stores; and Dr. Miriam A. Shelden, Dean of Women at the University of Illinois, Urbana, Illinois.
