Where attitudes differed it tended to be in favor of Jews, reveals Dr. Marx. He found that Negroes were less likely to accept negative. stereotypes of Jews, and in fact do not share the

traditional anti-Semitic biases.

Long interested in social protest, Dr. Marx was an associate member of CORE while at Berkeley. He is presently an Assistant Professor in the Department of Social Relations at Harvard University and a Research Associate at the M.I.T.-Harvard Joint Center for Urban

LONDON CONFERENCE

LONDON - (NPI)--Joseph Lewis Turner, associate editor, Negro Press International, represented the worldwide news agency at a five-day London conference devoted to "Forecast: 1968 -- The World In Perspective.

The conference, held Oct. 27 - Nov. 1, was sponsored by the Westinghouse Broadcasting Company, Inc., and attended by business leaders, government and education officials, and a select group of publishers, editors and writers.

Aware of the complexities of life in the late 1960's and how they affect everyone in many ways, Westinghouse emphasizes the increasing importance of keeping informed on events, not only of a local or regional nature, but of national and international scope as well.

"Thinking in global terms," the firm says, "is an inescapable part of our daily lives."

The responsibility of keeping the public informed is an integral part of Westinghouse's "Group W" policy, and one way of informing, according to Westinghouse "is through public." affairs, business and economic conferences' from which "great value will come."

IN LONDON, conference delegates had an opportunity to hear the voices of such highly placed British officials as the Rt. Hon. Earl of Avon, Anthony Eden, and George Brown, secretary of state for Foreign affairs.

Delegates also attended briefings by other leading European governmental figures and by "Group W" correspondents from throughout the world on European, Middle East and Soviet political and economic affairs.

There were briefings in marketing and advertising in England and on the Continent. These involved such topics as the Common Market and American business and investment prospects abroad.

THE DELEGATES were the dinner guests of Lord Thomson of Fleet, of the worldwide Thomson Communications organization. A group of British advertising executives also played hosts to delegates at a session providing an opportunity to exchange views on various subjects of mutual interest.
