

School integration has value for everyone, black and white, according to a survey made by the suburban White Plains (N.Y.) board of education.

After transporting Negro pupils from a virtually segregated inner-city school to outlying white schools, officials found that educational attainment went up along with classroom integration.

NEGRO PUPILS attending the integrated schools were achieving far more than Negro children who attended the jim crow schools.

And white students at the formerly lily-white schools were found to be doing as well as before, academically--if not better.

School integration appeared to help improve Negro pupils' school-work in accordance with the number of years it was practiced.

Negro youngsters who had always attended integrated schools were found to be doing better than those who started in a segregated school.

YOU DON'T have to be a woman to be a nutrition expert. Nor must you be white.

That's the word from instructors at North Carolina College's department of home econom-ics, who told of expanding job opportunities in food preparation.

Edward Ramsey, Jr., a new assistant pro-fessor in the Durham (N.C.) institution's department, spoke of "lucrative" job openings in the armed forces in civilian industry.

He noted that preparing packaged foods for

U.S. astronauts is a specialty in itself. "If you look at the business opportunities listed in the New York paper, you will see advertisements offering employment to food sci-entists, and they all say 'Salary open,' "Ramsey pointed out.

Although in most areas, nutrition is normally studied by women students, Ramsey does not feel there will be any difficulty in attracting men to the profession.

For one thing, he said, food scientists, certified by the American Dietetic Association, can be commissioned directly in the armed forces as second lieutenants.

The Air Force particularly has changed the image of the men responsible for food prepara-

tion, he added. "The washouts used to be assigned to the quartermaster corps as cooks. The space age has changed things," said Ramsey, who is trying to attract more students to the nutrition field.

The education or school park is the boldest plan yet proposed to integrate urban schools, according to John H. Fischer, president, Teach-

er College, Columbia University, New York. In a book, "Education Parks," published by the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights, Fischer and five other nationally-known educators appraised this new school concept which can improve the quality of education for all children while desegregating the schools.

Plans for the education park envision new and larger complexes of structures, especially designed for a diversity of student and teacher backgrounds and teaching techniques.

Education parks would accommodate student populations of from a few thousand to as many as 30,000.

Attendance areas would consist of a whole city, portions of a city; or a number sections within a metropolitan region.

Fischer sees the parks as the largest educational institutions ever established below the collegiate level and the first planned explicitly to cultivate racial integration as an element of good education.



"Race" Subject Of Address To Valley High Group



Southern Nevada Human Relations Commissioner, Rev. Welles Miller spoke to the students of Valley High School, Thursday, Nov. 9th, on the subject of "Race".

400 students taught by team instructors, William A. Hoffman and Walter R. Mason of the social studies department heard Rev. Miller compare current attitudes toward race with historical attitudes toward knowledge at two sessions, 10:00 a.m. and 1:30 p.m.

Pointing out that attitudes of race become a mental habit just as opening a door with the same hand all the time becomes a physical habit, he stressed that students were pioneers in the field of future race relations.

"My generation reacts from habit, yours will act from conviction", said Rev. Miller, 'if black man and white man can find common friendship, we will survive, if not, we will die. True you may have antagonisms, but your habit pattern has not become set and you can change.
