VATICAN CITY - (NPI)--Racism and interracial violence which "assume almost the proportions of genocide" were lamented by Pope
Paul VI last week, in a message distributed to
bishops, priests and the religious in Africa.
"Racial discrimination," said the Pope, "impedes the full development in the new African
states. The peaceful development and stability
of institutions are prerequisites for progress
in the new African states today."

### **CHANGES MIND**

ST. LOUIS - (NPI)--The Rt. Rev. George L. Cadigan, bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri, has changed his mind "for the present" about having two clergymen resign from the church because of their involvement in civil rights demonstrations. The reversal resulted from discussions between the bishop and the Revs. Walter W. Witte, Jr., and William Matheus, rector and curate respectively of the predominantly Negro member St. Stephen's church.

#### **VOLUNTEERS WANTED**

LOUISVILLE, Ky. - (NPI) -- Negro volunteers for the ministry are the subjects of a one-man crusade being conducted on the campuses of 129 predominantly Negro colleges in the nation. The idea is that of Robert B. Herndon, a retired, white Army chaplain from Atlanta, and he has the full support of the Southern Baptist Theological seminary, Louisville.

### SPLIT THINKING

WEST ALLIS, Wis. - (NPI)--Further evidences of the split in thinking of Catholic officials in the Milwaukee area came last week when a curate of St. Rita's Catholic church, warned officials of Milwaukee and its 17 suburbs not to be "pressured" into enacting "enforced" open occupancy ordinances. The Rev. Lawrence S. Brey charged that "such ordinances violate moral values, human rights and property rights...and a vote for an open housing ordinance would be a shameful surrender to (Fr.) Groppi and company."

### ZONING FIGHT

CHICAGO - (NPI)--Although the South Shore ministerial association has declined to intervene one way or the other, ministers in the neighborhood have registered objections to the proposed location of the Negro Metropolitan Church of God in quarters formerly used by a funeral home. The objections are said to be because of the already large number of churches in the area, but the Rev. Leroy Hickman, pastor of Metropolitan, charges his church is being kept out "for racial reasons. They don't want a Negro church in South Shore."



### C.O.G.I.C. Convocation

The 60th Annual Holy Convocation of the Churches of God in Christ attracted more than 25,000 delegates and visitors to the Mason Memorial Temple, Memphis, Tennessee for the 10-day conclave which opened Nov. 7, and concludes Friday, Nov. 17.

The Convocation was a memorial tribute to the late Bishop Charles Harrison Mason, founder of the religious denomination which now embraces more than 5,000 churches in the United States and abroad.
