Southern U Star Cager **All-American Potential**

BATON ROUGE, La. - (NPI)--Jasper Eilson is a 6'7" free-wheeling operator on the Southern University basketball team who is an oddson favorite to shoot and rebound his way onto several All-America teams before the upcoming cage season is finally wrapped up.

Sprinter speed and quickness, coupled with an exceptionally good eye for the basketball, makes Wilson'a tough man to defend. An aggressive rebounder and hard-working, hustling ballplayer, Wilson has good jumping ability, fights with fury on the boards and, as a senior center returning with All-SWAC status, leaves Jaguar head coach Dick Mack's Jaguars a team hard to ignore this season.

As a junior last season, Wilson couldn't be denied entry into the All-Southwestern Athletic Conference circle which included Grambling's James Jones, Arkansas AM&N's Robert Allen, and Jackson College's Edward Manning.

Southern's cagers ran to a 17-7 record last year, and the triumphs included copping the Grambling College tournament with an 83-82 finals victory over Grambling, and at least one victory on the year over every team in the league.

When Coach Mack appraises the high spots of the past campaign, he is liberal in his credits to Wilson as a terrific team leader, and a highly skilled shooter and rebounder.

Already Wilson has been selected to a pre-season "top-ten" players in the "SWAC" list, and in his junior year wowed the scouts with his uncanny accuracy, moves and toughness. Wilson finished the '66 season with a 22-plus scoring average and was high among the SWAC rebounders with a 15.4 average.

Southern's Coach Mack lists at least five professional players among his college coach-ing career, and he is quick to say that none of them--including current National Basketball Association star Dick (Skull) Barnett--had any more natural talents than Wilson and none were more coachable.

35¢.what emerges from the actual struggles of the Negro is a search for a total philosophy to change society from the bottom. The leaders, self-styled and otherwise, who presume to speak for the Negro, small-change it into a slogan ...

The simple truth is that it is the government--national, state, city and farm; the police, the prisons, and the courts--and not the outside agitators, which breed racism and evoke the wrath of the people. Outside of this reality, and the unvarying tale of police brutality, the greatest breeder of racism is Congress, rushing headlong into multiple investigations, not of the criminal system which produces racism, but of its victims

"It will not do to speak of a philosophy of history as if that ... is nothing more than the evacuating motion of the intellectual's own head. Unless the philosophy arises out of a historic movement of masses struggling for total freedom, and the whole world is its stage, it can neither answer the urgency of our life and times, nor bear the seeds of the future movement of humanity.'

THESE ARE random excerpts from "Black Mass Revolt," the latest issue of a pamphlet produced 10 times a year by a workers' organization in Detroit. The organization is described as a unique combination of worker and intellectual, in thought and action. It is an interracial organization, and has a Negro as editor of the pamphlet.

The pamphlet uses Detroit's riots of last summer as a basis to comment on topics like Law and Order from the Barrel of a Gun.' "Who Speaks for the Masses," "A New Stage of Race Consciousness: Class Awareness, and Where to Now?'

Through these topics, the pamphlet points to the problems and inequities in the Negro struggle, and suggests new philosophies, new courses of action, and new alignments of the poor and suffering masses of all races and nationalities.

The masses, it contends, must be heard, considered, and included in the making of a new society, starting by tearing capitalism out by the roots.

Throughout the pamphlet, there is a constant reference to the brotherhood of workers, black and white, especially in the Detroit area. It also suggests that automation be done away with, and the course of history turned over to the workers.

If these remarks, philosophy, preachments for the masses, brotherhood, etc., have a familiar ring, then heed what is being said and written around the Negro revolution, and be forewarned. We learn from experiences...or at least we "should" learn from our experiences....we lost a great many of our number during the thirties and forties to this same illusion.
