NEW YORK - (NPI)--Famous broad jumper Ralph Boston and sprinter Charlie Mays last week were reported to have entered the New York Athletic Club's annual Indoor Track meet set for Feb. 18, which Negro athletes have been asked to boycott, because the club allegedly does not allow them to join. The leaders of a movement to have Negroes boycott the 1968 Olympic Games as a protest against American racial discrimination have also asked Negroes not to participate in the NYAC meet.
