### "61 More Negroes Can Be **Elected To Congress Now"**

LOS ANGELES -- By means of the once denigrated "bloc voting", now recognized as the essence of black power, Negroes can elect 61 Negroes to Congress from 21 states this year to add to the six now there, according to the lead article, "Black Power is Bloc Voting", in the Tribune, Quarterly Organ of Negro Thought and Opinion, published by the Negro Political Action Council, or Negro-PAC.

The result of several months' research and firsthand investigation, the article, prepared by Tribune editor Almena Lomax, points out that it is now acknowledged by the major infor-mation media of the country that "Black power put Negroes into the Mayors' seats in Gary, Ind...and Cleveland...that it was black votes, not gremlins, which elected 21 Negroes in Mississippi, six in Virginia, besides nominating 73 others' in elections over the country last November. With such powerful personages as Henry Ford, II acknowledging that black power is "the power of the purse and the vote, of knowledge and skill, of self-discipline and self-confidence," Negroes, the Fall-Winter issue of the magazine said, need to "come in off the streets and stop worrying over 'massive stop-(See NEGROES, page 8)

## "Republican Sweep Here In '66" Sheer Fantasy

A feature story in a recent issue of the Las Vegas Sun carrying the byline of City Editor Jim Barrows began with the statement that Woodrow Wilson is a Republican member of the Nevada Assembly, and he is also a Negro. A factual statement, indeed. However, from that point emerged a bewildering morass of misinformation, false premises, and statements diametrically opposed to facts in evidenceregarding the local Negro vote in the '66 election.

The story evolved around the visit to Las Vegas, last week, of Clarence Lee Townes, Jr. special assistant to Republican National Committee Chairman Ray Bliss. According to Barrows, "Townes was checking on Assemblyman Wilson, and why the area from which he was elected provided so much of the punch that led to Gov. Paul Laxalt's election a year ago.'

· Townes was further quoted with the statement that "West Las Vegas, whatever its geo-graphic or municipal limits, represents 6,000 to 7,000 voters -- this area was a major factor in the Republican victory then, and political action there this year may be the motivating spark for further gains."

IT IS as puzzling as to how Townes could

have been so misinformed as it is how Barrows could have reported Townes remarks with a straight face. The election record shows that in the 18 precincts in West Las Vegas, Gover-nor Laxalt received 270 votes as opposed to 3070 cast for former Governor Grant Sawyer, (See GOP, page 4)

### NAACP Freedom Banquet Feb. 16 At Frontier Hotel

The annual Freedom Banquet of the local chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People will be held at the

Frontier Hotel, Friday, Feb. 16.

Keynote Speaker of the stellar event will be Attorney Irving Andrews of Denver, Colorado, the only Negro Councilman in the state. A Rhodes Scholar, Attorney Andrews gained national eminence when he served with the then NAACP Chief Legal Counselor, Justice Thurgood Marshall, in the Brown vs Board of Education appeal which resulted in the historic May, 1954 Supreme Court ruling on School Desegregation.

Tickets are now available at \$7.50 each for the Feb. 16 Banquet which will begin promptly at 8 p.m. Attorney Charles Kellar, President of the local NAACP branch, emphasized the importance of obtaining tickets and making reservations at the earliest date to avoid a repetition of last year's last minute rush on tickets with resulting disappointment to many who could not be accommodated.
