Open Housing Supporter Initiates New Approach

PROVIDENCE, R.I. - (NPI)--Fair housing laws, good intentions, and open housing marches often fail to integrate a neighborhood. But Irving Jay Fain, a leading businessman, may have found the trick that clicks:

He is personally integrating many formerly all-white residential areas in the Providence area by buying dwellings, improving them and renting them on an integrated basis.

Negroes get first crack at the housing; whites must get back to the rear of the line.

The 61-year-old head of several Rhode Island industrialist and mercantile concerns has no glorified self-image, however.
"I don't want to be put in the position of a

do-gooder, or someone that somebody else has to thank," he says. "There should be no call for thanking a landlord when he rents an apartment. That's what a landlord has a house for.

Fain, an active leader in the campaign that resulted in enactment of Rhode Island's 1965 fair-housing law, has been buying two-family dwellings in the Providence area and renting them at prices ranging from \$30 to \$175 a month. Some 25 Negroes and 90 white families have rented flats in the 47 houses he has bought.

The industrialist cites two causes of segregated housing: Stereotyped white attitudes and Negro fears of being rebuffed or harassed.

Fain maintains that his fair-housing program has dispelled the myth that whites will not move into a property already occupied by Negroes. White property owners who at first resisted his efforts later supported them, when they found that their racial fears were baseless, he said.


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
