# Double Feature On TV

Championship boxing returns to Las Vegas Monday evening, March 4, via closed circuit television when the Flamingo Hotel presents two title fights direct from the new Madison Square Garden on the huge closed circuit television screen in the Flamingo's main convention hall.

Over 3,000 seats are available for the big title doubleheader sending middleweight champ Emile Griffith against ex-champ Nino Benvenuti and undefeated heavyweight Buster Mathis against unbeaten former Olympic champion Joe Frazier.

Doors will open at 5:15 p.m. with the fight program beginning at 6:15. Tickets, priced at \$7 and \$10, are on sale at the Flamingo's casino cage, the El Cortez casino cage, West Hills Lanes and Davey's Locker.

The heavyweight battle is one that has been talked about for months with two young, explosive fighters risking their unblemished professional records. Mathis, trimmed down to a solid 240 pounds from his previous high of 300, has won 23 straight fights, 17 of them by knockouts. The 205-pound Frazier has put together 19 straight victories with 17 of them via the knockout route.

The middleweight scrap is a "rubber" match between the champion from the Virgin Islands and Benvenuti of Italy. Griffith lost his title just 10 months ago to Benvenuti but took it back last September. Both title fights went the full 15 rounds.

Griffith has been a long-time Las Vegas favorite, defending his world welterweight title here three times and winning one additional non-title fight. Benvenuti will be making only his third appearance in the United States with all three in New York.

### **Blues King In Concert**

"T-Bone", who usually shakes his audience up with his frenzied playing and antics, will be backed by a five-piece blues group.

## Flamingo Presents Title Job Corps Grads Prospects

WASHINGTON - (NPI)--Job Corps graduates have been found to finish their training with one of the highest unemployment rates in the country.

Twenty-nine per cent of them are out of work, according to a report by Louis Harris & Associates.

This is a higher percentage than the rate for non-white teenagers--26.4 per cent. The 29 per cent figure contrasts with 3.8 per cent unemployment among whites and about 7.6 per cent among black people, generally,

As bad off as many Job Corps graduates were, they were found to have better employment prospects, on the whole, than they did before they entered the federal anti-poverty pro-

Of the 656 young men who answered the Harris report questions, about 65 per cent were in jobs, 7 per cent were in school, and about 29 per cent were out of work. Most Job Corpsmen are teenagers.

The employment rate for Job Corps graduates was found to vary from 71 per cent for those who stayed in the training centers until graduation to 58 per cent for those who stayed less than three months.

Negro and white Job Corps graduates appeared to have about the same unemployment rate.
