Vietnam Vets Recruited For N.Y. Police Duty

NEW YORK - (NPI)--Servicemen returning from Vietnam--many of them Negroes and Puerto Ricans--are being recruited for duty with the police department.

The Ford foundation is being asked to pay for training the ex-GIs and preparing them for the civil service examinations.

The police is seeking the veterans in an effort to beef up the number of minority members within its ranks. The department has enough men, but only five per cent are Negroes and two per cent, Puerto Ricans--in a city where the two groups together make up almost half the population.

The program has started with a pilot project for 150 trainees, mostly Negro. The class was filled by teams which visited the Harlem East Bronx, and Bedford-Stuyvesantareas.

The Morgan Guaranty Trust Company contributed \$10,000 to pay for the 80-hour course.



Urban League "In Touch"

LOS ANGELES - (NPI)--Is the Urban League out of touch with the militant element of the Negro community?

This city's new Urban League executive director, Frank L. Stanley, denies it. In fact, he believes that militants will have new respect for his organization when they learn how meaningful Urban League programs are.

Stanley said 95 per cent of the resolutions that came out of the Newark (N.J.) black power conference "sounded like Urban League programs."

Formerly editor of the Louisville Defender and a special assistant to Whimey M. Young, National Urban League Director, Stanley urged his organization to become "an advocate of institutional change" and to concentrate on health and welfare, housing and political action programs.

This change is necessary, he said, because of the "multiplicity of forces threading the fabric of social dynamite in Los Angeles."
