## Who'll Replace Powell

NEW YORK - (NPI)--Who'll sit on Adam Clayton Powell's Harlem throne? Neither Powell himself, nor any of his would-be successors.

This has become increasingly apparent as the ousted Congressman suffered another court setback in his effort to regain his House seat while refraining from naming a successor.

Powell was struck down by the U.S. Court of Appeals, which ruled that it would not interfere with his exclusion. The three-judge panel said it could not tell a co-equal branch of government (the U.S. House of Representatives) what to do.

The court's decision left only the U.S. Supreme Court where Powell could appeal his

Meanwhile, November Congressional elections were drawing near, and several possible heirs to Powell's throne were being talked up. None of them, however, had much of a chance unless the ousted Congressman gave them his blessings.

And so far, Powell hasn't indicated his preference. But if he does speak out, he might lean toward national CORE Chairman Floyd McKissick, whose black power views he shares.

Among front-running Democratic contenders are McKissick, Livingston Wingate, former Haryou-Act chief; State Sen. Basil A. Patterson; Assemblyman Charles B. Rangel; and Joseph Overton, head of the New Breed organization.

Among the Republicans, only James Meredith has announced his candidacy. Also mentioned is William H. Booth, the city's Human Rights Commission Chairman.

## Justice Is Served

ATLANTA - (NPI) -- A black combat veteran, Spec. 5 Emmett T. Doe, Jr., 26, has been acquitted of calling a captain a "white bastard." Doe admitted using the word "bastard," but denied using it and the racial designation with specific reference to Capt. Larry Tyree.

The Third Army Board, sitting at Fr. Mc-Pherson, cleared the specialist of disrespect,
