ORANGEBURG, S.C. - (NPI)--This city's bowling alley, which used to allow only white strikes, now is permitting black strikes, as well

The All Star Triangle Bowl, scene of violence which resulted in the deaths of three students, agreed to open its doors to all, after being so ordered by U.S. District Judge Robert Martin, Jr., sitting in Columbia, S.C.

There were no incidents, thanks to the presence of a half-dozen detectives.

Owners of the alley, Harry K. Floyd and Carolyn Floyd, had maintained their establishment was not covered by the 1964 Civil Rights

Act, but their plea was rejected.

Eating facilities at the alley had been closed the day before U.S. Atty-Gen. Ramsey Clark brought suit. Even after the black strikes began mingling with white strikes, the lunch counter remained closed.
