New Trouble For Hatcher

GARY, Ind. - (NPI)--As if this city's mayor, Richard G. Hatcher, did not have enough trouble, he's been accused of "hiding the fact that law enforcement has broken down in Gary."

The statement was made by Henry Kowalczyk, Lake County prosecutor, who said he would call Hatcher and James Hilton, Gary police chief, before a county grand jury which he will ask to investigate crime in Gary.

The charge against Hatcher was made only a few weeks after the mayor was accused by a city councilman of being soft on prostitution and gang violence in the city.

Hatcher's answer to that charge was that his hands were tied by a shortage of funds needed for adequate police protection.

The mayor also had an answer to the latest charge: The prosecutor, Hatcher said, is using the grand jury as a political weapon.

"This is our reward for attempting to enforce the law, and it is an obvious effort to intimidate the chief," Mayor Hatcher said.

"We have made an effort to crack down on all types of crimes and are not impressed by the machinations of the prosecutor."

Debt Limit Hamstrings Nevada Building Plans

On November 5 Nevada's voters will make a decision on an issue which will prove vital to the financial stability of the state for decades to come. There are many people, however, who fear the voters will go the wrong way on the question because it is involved and a bit obscure.

The issue will be expressed in Question number two on the ballot and require a "yes" vote. It is a proposal to change the constitution in order to increase Nevada's bonded debt limit from one to three per cent of the state's assessed valuation.

At the present time Nevada may borrow through the sale of bonds only up to one per cent of the assessed value of all of the property on the tax rolls.

This limitation was set in 1916 when the population of the state was small and there was little need for the construction of new buildings.

Now Nevada is among the fastest growing states in the nation and it is imperative that it borrow money to build schools, universities and other institutions.

It is no more reasonable for the state to pay cash out of operating funds for buildings than it is for the average wage earner to think he can buy a home without a long-term loan.

All that question two allows is an increase in the amount the state can borrow relative to the value of the taxable property which will stand behind such loans.

There will be no increase in taxes and the state will be in no danger of borrowing too much. Lenders in the bond market would not purchase Nevada bonds if it borrowed beyond its capacity.

The constitutional provision which sets the limit has been approved by the legislature and is supported by every knowledgeable public leader in the state.

There is no apparent opposition to the idea. There exists only the fear that voters may not fully understand the problem and defeat the proposal as they did eight years ago.

Nevada's state planning board lists \$98 million in construction needs. Meanwhile, building costs are rising. It would be economical for Nevada to avoid further delay in acquiring the buildings it needs.

Consequently, it is vital that this arbitrary limitation on debt be raised to free the state for further expansion.

Vote "yes" on question number two on election day.
