North Las Vegas residents are expected to fill the Council chambers, Sunday, June 1st at the stroke of 3:30 PM when the Las Vegas Voice unwinds its Aaron Williams Day appreciation and acknowledgment ceremonies.

North Las Vegas Mayor Gene Echols, and Las Vegas Mayor Oran Gragson will lead the parade of "Twin Cities" officials who will take part. NLV councilman C. R. (Bud) Cleland will also be on hand.

Rev. Mike Friedman of 1st Baptist Church will offer the Invocation. Rev. Marion D. Bennett of Zion Methodist will render the Benediction. Both head churches in North Las Vegas.

The state's top elected officials have indicated strong wishes to be present but because of previous commitments have been forced to decline. Senator Alan Bible, Senator Howard Cannon, U.S. Representative-at-large Walter S. Baring, and Gov. Paul Laxalt are among these.

Still expected are Lt. Gov. Ed Fike, the rest of the councilmen, several assemblymen and the mayors of Henderson and Boulder City.

Both the Valley Times and the N. Las Vegas News have lent their full support and endorsement to the idea.

Mrs. Dorothy Ames is conducting a telephone marathon to citizens urging them to show up in numbers for the ceremonies. She will also assign six ladies to care for the ushering chores.

Mr. Williams is the first Nevadan Negro elected to a city office and many feel this signal honor should be publicly acknowledged.

Rollo S. Vest, new managing editor of the Voice will serve as master of ceremonies.
