NEIGHBORHOOD COUNCIL NEWS

Last week, one Neighborhood Council member had an interesting thing happen. During the month of May, she was away from the small efficiency apartment she occupied. After returning home, she went down to the Nevada Power Company to pay her bill. She was presented a bill for \$5 for June and \$12 for May (the month she was away from home). This totaled \$17. Some individuals would have paid without question, but her Service Worker advised her to look into it further. She did, and wouldn't you know they had made a mistake. Why does the Power Co. in Vegas always make mistakes in their favor?

Another customer complained of paying one bill twice during the month of December when all Westside bills generally go up, so if you don't have Xmas decorations up, you should, in view of the upsurge. The writer has lived on the Westside and is now elsewhere in a house of the same type with the same number of appliances etc., and is currently receiving bills that range from 10% to 20% less. Something is wrong. We strongly recommend that two steps be taken.

First, if you suffer an injustice, refer it to your Neighborhood Council Worker who will in turn channel it into the right legal area. Very soon we will make efforts to educate the general public on how to read their meters. We know it to be a fact that many bills here are done entirely by estimation. Your help is needed if we are to see changes come about here. The P.U.C. is only a part of the establishment.

It would be to our advantage to bind our forces into an organized group. Neighborhood Council is you, and your neighbor, and the guy across the way blending these forces for the good of all, knowing there is unity in strength.
