

NROTC COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIPS

What's in your future? Your senior year in high school is fast approaching. Many of you are thinking about college plans already--it's not too early. Don't overlook your chances of a college scholarship. Your college planning

should include a close look at the NROTC College Scholarship Program. This program offers a scholarship and a rewarding career in service to the American people.

The NROTC College Scholarship Program

trains career officers for the Navy and Marine Corps. Benefits include Navy payment of tuition, educational fees, textbooks, uniforms, and a \$50 monthly subsistence allowance for four years. Selected candidates are en-

listed in the U.S. Naval Reserve and are appointed midshipman upon enrollment in college. The college majors which a candidate may undertake are many and only a few nontechnical professional majors are prohibited. During the summers between college years, midshipmen participate in at-sea training periods which provide practical experience in naval operations and from which they receive many varied and rewarding experiences. Upon graduation, midshipmen may be commissioned as Ensigns in the U.S. Navy, or as Second Lieutenants in the U.S. Marine Corps.

Applicants for this program will be considered based on scores obtained on either the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) of the College Entrance examination Board (CEEB), Princeton, New Jersey or the American College Test (ACT) of the American College Testing Program, Iowa City, Iowa, in lieu of the Navy College Aptitude Test (NCAT) previously utilized.

Applicants for the the 1971 NROTC College Scholarship Program must:

Apply for and take either test specified above at their own expense prior to 31 December 1970.

Arrange with the appropriate testing agency for the submission of their scores to the NROTC College Scholarship Program.

Apply for the NROTC College Scholarship Program between 1 April 1970 and 1 December 1970 in accordance with the 1971 Bulletin of Information.
