Pledging to restore fiscal responsibility and quality education to Southern Nevada, three Las Vegans filed today as members of a reform ticket to run for at-large seats on the Clark County District Board of Education.

Filing as a team were James C. Andrus, 34, a certified public accountant; Gill Blonsley, 32, administrative officer for the District Health Department, and Paul V. Carelli, 31, an attorney.

The three candidates pledged to conduct the affairs of the school district in public and end the practice of board decisions being made behind closed doors.

The candidates state that, "We hope to help re-shape our school system to benefit the people most directly concerned: The children who need to learn and the teachers who want to be effective in their jobs.

Criticizing what they termed was a growing breakdown in communications between school authorities and the public, the three agreed the school board should create a committee made up of representation from the Parent Teachers Association, teachers groups, board members and students.

The committee would serve as a public sounding board to discuss major problems and to explore new alternatives for emerging problems.
