CCSD ADVICE TO PARENTS FOR DURING DISTURBANCES

What instructions should parents give their students to minimize involvement when a disturbance hits a school campus?

According to high school principals and secondary administrators in the Clark County School District, parents should instruct their teenagers to report to their classroom immediately and stay there until instructed to leave.

Well over 90 per cent of students, both black and white, want nothing to do with the disturbance, principals say, and these students are safest in a classroom.

Students should not attempt to leave campus, because this places them in an isolated situation where the chances of injury are great. Several students have been assaulted while attempting to obey parents' orders to "get home as soon as possible when trouble starts," according to high school principals.

Principals will release students to parents when requested to do so, but they will not allow students to leave campus on their own. Parents who want to remove their students should report to the principal's office. The student will be asked to meet his parents there as soon as it is safe for him to leave his class.

Students who attempt to leave the school on their own often become the victims of indiscriminate assualts, and they run a good chance of being arrested for not beign in their assigned location.

Here is a step-by-step plan for students that school administrators feel will minimize personal danger:

1. If you know of impending trouble, notify school officials so appropriate action can be taken.

and you can't get back on, go home immediately. Have your parents call the school so authorities know where you are.



ually the disturbance involves a small number of students in a given school area. Do not become a member of the disturbance group, and stay away from the trouble area.

5. Follow directions from school officials and police officers, and no one else. School officials will be wearing badges identifying them, and most police officers will be in umiform.

6. Don't assume anything. When in coubt about instructions or procedures, ask a school teacher or administrator.

7. Be wary of rumors. Rumors always make the situation worse than it actually is, they always spread more rapidly than the truth. In many instances rumors have been responsible for the incident in the first place.

8. If your school is hit by a disturbance one day, come to school as late as possible the following day and go immediately to your first period class. Avoid potential trouble spots, and don't let yourself be pulled into a group that might be looking for trouble.

9. Finally, practice the Golden Rule and Brotherhood at all times. Remember to recognize fellow students as individuals and judge them as such. Remember that well over 90 per cent of all students, both black and white, are in school for education; they want nothing to do with those who would create disturbances.
