BLACK DOCTORS IN FIGHT AGAINST CANCER

Among other presentations were those of Dr. Clarence D. Hinton of Washington D. C., who discussed cancer of the nasal passages; Dr. James Anthony, also of Washington, who talked on treating cancer of the male organs; Dr. Watson A. Young of Inkster, Mich., who discussed cervical cancer; and Dr. Harold Perry of Detroit, who discussed various methods of Yaray troit, who discussed various methods of X-ray treatment.

A National Cancer Institue exhibit, "The Search for New Anti-Cancer Drugs," showed how new agents derived from the jungles and oceans of Africa, Asia, and South America; from the reasearch laboratories, universities, industries and from ancient folk remedies are tested for anti-tumor potential in rodents. Then they are studied for toxicity in monkeys and apes before trial in humans begins.

Present also was Dr. Robert S. Jason, Chairman of the NMA Judicial Council, former Dean of Howard's College of Medicine, and a Director-

at-Large of the American Cancer Society. Commenting on the dearth of black research commenting on the dearth of black research scientists not only in cancer but generally, Dr. Jason laid blame on "stringent economic requirements both before and after school" and the past "lack of opportunities for affiliation with the big medical schools and their facilities." This situation, he said, was "easing somewhat," adding that "some of the young black doctors will make important contributions to cancer research." to cancer research.

The five-day meeting was a landmark in medical history, the NMA having been founded in Atlanta in 1895 during the Cotton States Exposition at a time when black physicians were not welcome in the American Medical Associa-

This convention was addressed by AMA President Dr. Walter C. Bornemeir, who presented a plaque to Dr. Hill commemorating the occasion.

But perhaps Dr. Edward W. Reed of Memphis, Tenn., a member of the Mid-South Medical Council Executive Committee summed up the feeling of the young black doctors, concerning cancer and other research. He said: "With the coming of HEW and the pressure for equal education opportunities, a few cracks have been opened. We must go in and press relentlessly. The black physician who would provide better health care for his people and others must be competent, concerning and compassionate."
