

LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS

"We are concerned about children in trouble--thousands of Nevada children. Daily headlines, police reports tell a story of burglary, drug possession, runaways, truancy, assault, auto-theft, disorderly conduct, vandalism...the list goes on and on. Why? What happened? Personal pathology? A response to frustration...A multitude of causes, but the law provides the label...juvenile delinquent...a cold, matter-of-fact term, broadly applied. And a trip through the juvenile justice system begins..."

So begins the latest publication of the League of Women Voters of Nevada entitled CHILDREN IN TROUBLE, A Look at Problems of Delinquency in Nevada. The 25-page booklet is the result of nine months of research, observing, interviewing by members of League resource committees in both southern and northern Nevada. The publication is directed at five specific areas:

1. INTRODUCTION, with national and state

2. PRIOR TO DELINQUENCY, a discussion of basic causes, various types of preventive measures with examples of some programs operating in Nevada.
3. AFTER THE ACT, dealing with the problem after the juvenile comes in contact with the law enforcement with emphasis on alternatives to traditional institutionalization.
4. A LOOK AT THE RECORD, an exploration of the politics regarding confidentiality and expungement of juvenile records with a look at Nevada law, current practice, and some recommendations for change, and
5. A GENERATION GOING TO POT?, pointing to marijuana's relationship to current drug culture, discussion of facts, law, trends in thinking regarding marijuana use and penalties, and guidelines for effective drug abuse education.

In addition to being the basis of League discussion and consensus on problems relating to delinquency in Nevada, the booklet can serve as a useful resource and reference material to others in the community, particularly parents, teachers, ministers, youth workers, etc. Discussion questions at the end of each chapter make it valuable for study groups, FTA, and university classes. The League can provide either discussion leaders or speakers to elaborate further on the research it has done in this area.

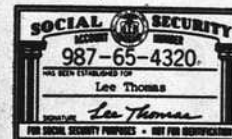
