policemen who testified in Justice or District Courts.

The Dist. Atty. George Franklin halted the practice of his office paying the witnesses fees and Gripenrog filed a lawsuit in an attempt to force the district attorney to resume paying the fees.

The lawsuit, however, was ruled defective as the city was not an actual party to the action and the suit did not list an officer as a victim.

Gripenrog was told of the reported defect but refused to amend the lawsuit and it wasn't until Officer Patrick Stevens and the Police Protective Association intervened several months later that the path was cleared for the case to go to court.

Gripenrog was the prime force seeking to have Bolden fired from his job on the Las Vegas Police Department and, in fact, was the one who leveled charges against Bolden that he cheated on a promotion exam.

Gripenrog also prosecuted Bolden at a Civil Service Commission hearing and although there was no evidence to prove Bolden cheated, the city attorney did succeed in preventing the lieutenant from being promoted to captain.

"The city attorney is supposed to give advice to the city departments," Archie said, "but the statements Gripenrog made during the hearing, which had no basis in fact, so prejudiced that case that no fair decision could have resulted."

"Major issues such as these have prompted the move for the recall," Archie said.



Archie did not give any indication when sufficient names would be on the petition to bring the case to court.



Under Nevada law, a recall petition must have the signatures of registered voters in the city equal to 25 per cent the total number of votes cast in the last election in the City of Las Vegas.



When sufficient names are gathered, a district judge will have five days to determine the sufficiency and validity of the petition and, if valid, will order a special election within 20 days for the people to determine whether the person involved should be recalled.


