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NICKELS TO FILE FOR CITY COMMISSION SEAT



Carol Nickles, 37, says she is "fed up with secret contract awards and rate increases, and after-the-fact public disclosure of high level decisions" and will file for the Las Vegas City Commission seat presently held by Wes Howery. "There shouldn't be a gap between a public trust and the public's right to know," she said. "We need tighter conflict of interest laws and public disclosure of campaign contributions. I will make public a full accounting of both source and expense of all monies spent on my campaign, and challenge my opponent to do likewise. I'm told that there are no rich men in Mr. Howery's family. If that is true and he requires outside support, the list of his private contributors should make good reading."

Miss Nickles also charged that "this city's problems and the sums of money spent to solve them are too big to be handled by part-time commissioners whose full-time occupations make them inaccessible to the people. I intend to be a full-time commissioner," she said, "that anyone can reach at City Hall from 9 to 5 days a week."

At a recent Commission meeting, Miss Nickles criticized Wes Howery's participation in the 1969 grant of a 41 per cent rate increase to Silver State Disposal, holder of an exclusive franchise to collect city garbage. "An increase of 18 percent was requested and studied," she said, "but out of nowhere came the boondoggling scheme that if the rate were raised to 41 percent desert dumping would be eliminated. City homeowners have paid nearly a quarter of a million dollars for that once-a-month special pickup solution, but it is obviously inadequate as our surrounding desert sadly proves."

Miss Nickles called for immediate action by citizens "to stop another boondoggling scheme about to be foisted upon us. This is the multi-million dollar scheme to end Lake Mead pollution by pumping Vegas effluent 30 miles uphill to Arrow Canyon. It will make a few contractors rich," she asserted, "But common sense dictates that we should first try to solve the problem for free...by banning the sale of high-phosphate detergents and controlling industrial discharge of chemicals which together are responsible for the eutrophication, or green scum pollution, of the Lake."

Asked how she felt about the awesome task of running against a powerful incumbent, Miss Nickles smiled saying, "Wasn't it Jack Kennedy who said, 'I do not shrink from the responsibility, I welcome it.'"

and many of those abroad. This cooperation has made possible an unparalleled assemblage of motion picture footage, much of it never previously exhibited on the man called Martin Luther King, and on one of the major social movements in the annals of this country.

As history and as social commentary, "KING" stands as an invaluable document--and as a record of our times, it has profound significance for all Americans.

The four other films nominated with "KING" are "Chariot of the Gods", "Jack Johnson", "Say Goodbye" and "Woodstock."

The winning film will be announced at the 43rd presentation of the Academy Awards on April 15 in Los Angeles.

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
