### Kindergarten Entrance Age Moved Up

Kindergarten students must be five by November 30 to enroll in school this fall, according to a bill passed by this session of the legislature. Previously students were admitted to kinder-garten if their fifth birthday fell before December 31.

In 1972, children must reach their fifth birthday by October 30, and in 1973 by Sept-ember 30 to enroll in kindergarten.

Students enrolled in kindergarten now will be eligible for first grade this fall, but in 1972 they must be six by November 30, October 31 in 1973 and September 30 in 1974 to enroll in first grade.

Parents are required to present proof of age at the time their child is registered for Kindergarten (or for first grade if they are new to the District). Birth certificates are the best proof, and parents who have lost the original may get a duplicate from the District Health Office for children born in Clark County. The price is \$2.00.

Persons from out of state should contact the Bureau of Vital Statistics in the capital of the state where their child was born.
