YOUTH HONORED FOR ACADEMIC AND WORK SKILLS A







Thirty-one enrollees of the "Work Experience for Youth," (WEY) program were honored Friday at a Luncheon in the Frontier Steak House of the Frontier Hotel. Achievement certificates were awarded WEY enrollees for whom job placement has been obtained, and also to five Summer '71 high school graduates (four female and one male) who received high school diplomas from Valley High School's Las Vegas Urban High School where classes are conducted in the evening. (An additional two WEY enrollees are expected to receive high school diplomas at the end of the summer semester).

The Work Experience for Youth program is

a component of the Economic Opportunity Board of Clark County sponsored Concentrated Employment Program (CEP), and it provides both education and work experience for youths through ages 18 - 22 who are school drop outs. Young people enrolled in the Program which is funded the U. S. Department of Labor, are placed in various agencies throughout the City to obtain work experience for which they receive \$1.90 an hour for a 32 hour work week. They also receive six hours of remedial education a week, and two hours of counseling, weekly.

The Program is presently funded for 45 en-

rollees, 40% of whom attended classes at Valley High's Las Vegas Urban High School. Three of the five graduates honored Friday, have already been tabbed for employment - two with the State Highway Department and one with the Central Telephone Company. Former WEY enrollees also have been absorbed in the EOB-CEP personnel staff after completion of WEY

academic-work skill training.

Rev. Leon Smith, WEY Coordinator, said that the Program has been of immeasureable value in providing work training and remedial edu-cation to disadvantaged youth, especially to those youngsters who became school drop outs, primarily, because of family financial woes. "These are the youngsters," said Rev. Smith, we find eager to attend classes, and who more

easily achieve academic and work training skills

for employability.'

Rev. Smith also said that he is particularly pleased with the fact that there are graduates from the WEY program now enrolled as full time students at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas.
