Pat Watters, author of the new book "The South and the Nation," will give public television viewers a unique perspective on life in the new South Monday, August 16 at 9 p.m. on Channel 10. Watters, who has written widely on the South, will be the featured reporter on a one-hour documentary entitled "If Eugene Talmadge were alive today, he'd turn over in his grave..."The documentary, part of the public television's Realities series, is produced by NET and tranmitted nationally by the Public Broadcasting Service.

In his documentary study of the South, Watters focuses on Georgia, where he has lived most of his life. In a 3,000-mile tour of the state, he interviews a cross-section of inhabitants, both black and white, garnering attitudes and opinions about the changing social and economic conditions. The study probes areas such as racial relations, the condition of the poor white man. the decline of agriculture, and the rise of large cities.

Watters' "The South and the Nation," published by Pantheon Books, a division of Random House, was lauded in the New Yorker magazine as an "exceptionally clear-headed book."

In a review in the New Yorker magazine Harvard psychiatrist Robert Coles, says: "Those who want to understand why Lester Maddox is Governor of Georgia and why George Wallace is so popular in Alabama (among other places) will find Pat Watters...helpful indeed... .he speaks to readers who want something more than definitions and italicized conclusions...Pat Watters may not be a novelist...he is in essence a historian--but he has a novelist's eyes and ears. He can sense and convey drama and ambiguity."

Dr. Coles predicts that "Pat Watters and his book will not have an easy-time of it, in either the South or other parts of this country...His book--a sort of farewell to the old, distorted South--requires us to look at what is both real and grotesque in the rest of America, what threatens not only 'The South and the Nation' but the whole world."

Watters, 43, is a native of Spartenburg, South Carolina, and a graduate of Emory University in Atlanta, Georgia. He has an M.A. from the University of Iowa and is a former city editor of The Atlanta Journal. The NET documentary, for which Harry McCarthy is executive producer, is Watters' first venture into broadcast journalism.

Watters is co-author with Reese Cleghorn of "Climbing Jacob's Ladder," a book about the arrival of blacks into Southern politics, published in 1967. He has also written articles on the South and race relations in Atlantic, Harper's, New American Review, New York Times Sunday Magazine, New Republic, the Nation, New South, Katallegate, Dissent and others.
