

HEARTBREAKS AND HEADACHES.

The United Harlem Drug Fighters quietly celebrated the first anniversary of its program in the Harlem Hospital. The group made far bigger headlines just beyond a year ago clammering for a place to treat those who had been weighted down by a monkey on their backs. What has been done deserved more than a passing note. The good that has been accomplished has been like a ray of sun shine knifing a light sliver through the darkness of a community confronted by a growing drug society. According to Martha Davis, executive director of the hard fought for program, the UHDF, has been successful in converting some 60% of the addicts treated. Many of them are back in school or on their jobs. The great tragedy is that there's so little room and too few beds, for so few people really seem to care.

After a year the progran is still alledgedly staff poor with no counselling or recreational facilities. It only has volunteer nurses looking in and too often the doctor on call is out of hearing range. Soap and toilet paper, at times, are hard to find and often food is of a sort which causes riots in prisions. These are just some of the charges which have been lodged one year after.

Here because they have been caught up in the savagery of our time these are kids who betrayed their weaknesses to relieve their fears. Though most of them are from a background of poverty, fear and degradation too awful to be acceptable to any man of spirit, within the program many are showing a new kind of strength as they struggle against their fate.
