

Names In The News

Christmas week was a week of many arrest.

Police arrested Calvin Lightford, on two counts of selling heroin and two counts of possession.

Willie Hawkins, 1000 Monroe was hospitalized at Southern Nevada Memorial Hospital after he was allegedly shot in the stomach by Alexander Simons, 1941 No. "H" St. Simons was jailed on the charge.

Also jailed for a allegedly shooting Robert Edwards, 2720 Sword St., North Las Vegas was Coraine Baugh, 832 Hart.

Police are still investigating both shootings.

Mrs. Maude Moore, 35, of 500 Miller Rd. was struck by a car while kneeling to comfort her pet German Shepherd that had been struck by a car a few minutes before. Police identified the driver of the car involved in the accident as Robert P. Johnson. The accident occurred on that very dark corner of Miller Rd., and LaSalle about 10:25 p.m.

Tony McCormick, Executive Director of the Nevada Equal Rights Commission was shot by a lady while listening to her complaint, in his Reno office.

One of the shots graved McCormicks arm, but caused no serious injury.

Judy Bayley, owner and operator of the Hacienda Hotel died in her hotel suite Friday, after a losing battle with cancer.

Mrs. Bayley was wellknown as one person who could always be counted on to aid in any charitable causes. Funeral services were attended by approximately 1500 persons.

Highway Notice

The detour north of Owens Avenue at the Union Pacific crossing will be closed all day Monday, January 10, beginning at 7 a.m. while the railroad tracks are being elevated, Resident Engineer Deon Sanders reported.

The public finding it necessary to use Owens during the day will be routed by barricades to the closest convenient crossing, but District Engineer Jack Parvin of the Nevada Highway Department suggested that alternate routes be planned by motorists for next Monday.

Construction of the Owens Avenue Interstate 15 crossing of the railroad tracks is a \$1,579,194.94 project that also includes the Lake Mead Blvd. crossing of the freeway.

Contractor on the job is Frehner Trucking Service. The project has been under way since June 15, 1970.

CONGRESSIONAL BLACK CAUCUS ANNOUNCES LEGISLATIVE INVESTIGATION SERVICE

WASHINGTON, D.C., December 28, 1971--A legislative investigation service to analyze legislation and interpret the guidelines of enacted bills, and to identify and monitor pending bills was announced by the Congressional Black Caucus according to Howard Robinson, Executive Director.

The Congressional Black Caucus will identify, monitor and follow from beginning to end the legislation that will have immediate or long range, direct or indirect effect on the lives of Black people. Once the bill is passed, the legis-

lative investigation service will analyze the bill and interpret its administrative guidelines for the benefits or unfavorable affect to Black Americans.

Such investigation and casework is now being conducted by the staff of the Congressional Black Caucus, but increased emphasis will be placed on these activities, including a larger number of bills studied and a more indepth analysis made.
