Reno N.A.A.C.P. Criticizes Equal Rights Commission

Bertha Woodard, President of the Reno-Sparks branch of the National Association for Colored People, called the commission's investigation by Director Tony McCormick on a House of Prostitution "a grandstand publicity stunt."

Mrs. Woodard said the commission has achieved for itself a national image as beingtough on houses of prostitution charged with discrimination. Mrs. Woodard said, "this commission has been pussyfooting around on the vital issues of employment, housing, health and welfare." She said the commission at its December meeting in Reno postponed "numerous complaints of discrimination because the commission had not done its home work."

Mrs. Woodard added that Gov. Mike O'Callaghan is ultimately responsible for the inaction of the commission, because he appoints it members.
