WITH MALICE TOWARDS SOME

There is no set pattern for judging the right or wrong of human behavior, it's more a matter of how one feels. In fact, even the "good book" failed to draw a sharp demarcation be-tween right and wrong. It just said, "thou shall not' do it. Though aware that politics spawns strange bedfellows, I think it was wrong that Black leaders throughout the country failed to throw their support behind the presidential candidacy of Congress-lady Shirley Chisholm. It seemed to me that their backing right up through the last ballot of the Democratic convention would have really given Black Americans bargaining points. Such a move would have thrown white America into a dilemma, and would have denied racist rats the opportunity of deserting the "Liberal ship" of the white candidate nominated to challenge President Richard Nixon.

It's a funny game these politicians play, and by now Black leaders should have become more aware of every twist and turn. The whites of leadership leaning have been playing in the big leagues for generations. Having stood on the side lines watching the pass-ing parade for all these years there is no excuse for Blacks to still be messing around with the "farm team." Personally, I don't have anything against Senator George Mc-Govern, and am still grateful for the many stands in favor of justice which Senator Hubet H. Humphrey took when it wasn't even popular. However, they both lack the Black experience, and when the chips are down Black needs have got to be secondary, The all but embracing of Gov. George Wallace, by both men of subject here, is a case in point.

It's difficult to believe that the Kennedys have given up all designs on the White House and are therefore sincere in their belief that a Democrat will win in '72. Such a phenomenon would undoubtedly knock Sen. Edward Kennedy out of the running in '76 a year in which, by law, President Nixon cannot run for reelection. With all these theories figured in it would have been easy for all our leaders to use the backing of Shirley Chisholm to enhance our position in the political arena.

Bernard Jackson, a young N'Yorker who's done it all, took his defeat for the State Assembly like a champion. He bucked the machine and was chewed up. The same can be said for Livingston Wingate who was resoundly out polled by the incumbent Congressman Charles Rangel...Dr. Lucious Walker, exec. Dir. of IFCO, is stepping up the drive to establish local Black United Funds since many of the major foundations have curtailed their support of Black causes. IFCO is the largest Black-controlled foundation in the nation, funded by 13 religious denominations...The Alliance for a Safer New York has a drive on for more citizens awareness of the convict problem. According to figures just releases, over 100,000 ex-convicts hit the streets of N'York each year from city, state, or federal prisons. Existing programs and supported services for these ex-offenders can take care of no more than 35,000 persons per year. The New York City Manpower Area Planning Council accepts the situation as so serious it's on the verge of refusing to fund training programs unless they are tied directly to job commitments.

Racial rumblings can still be heard behind the N'York take over of George Wein's Newport Jazz Festival. Black promoters expressed amazement that "Fun City" gave up every-thing for the event, cancelling all out-door programs that would have clashed with NJF. The annual New York Musicians Jazz Festival, composed of Black stalwarts like Sam Rivers, Roland Kirk, Andy Hill, Suma Sutan, and Black Voices had its out-door places cancelled as its free concerts would have clashed with Wein's Commercial venture. The Urban League will reap benefits from one of the jazz festival e-vents, and a lot of Black stars will pocket a lot of money.

With all the political noise beating down your hearing, don't forget that Sen. Ed Brooke is

running for re-election in Mass. Send money, if you can't vote for him. He's the only Black Senator you're likely to have for a time...That lovely Liz Campbell and her enormoudly talented husband, Gordon Parks, are heading for the divorce courts...Muhammad Ali is about the only American the Turks love and respect. Things are so tense between the Turks and the American GI's, you can cut it with a dull knife. It's the holdover madness caused by the killing of a Turkish General several months ago... Chuck Moore, creator and head of 3rd World Media News, invited Pres. Nixon to Harlem. Chuck and his spouse were among some 110 radio-news guys invited to the "Pale House" by the chief exec. There were six other Blacks with invitations...Max Roach, now with a "full professorship," Prof. of Music, U. of Mass., has been named "Man of the Year" by 3rd. World Media News William Knowledge the Ha World Media News ... William Knowlton, the Hawaii composer, is trying out the mainland for size with a fune tune he just added the final period to "Boogie-Woogie on St. Spiro Blues (Agnew)"...The Mutual Black Network has contracted to broadcast 10 Black college football games this fall...Manhattan Boro Prexy Percy Sutton is one who told this scribe '72 isn't the year of the Liberals. Therefore, he will not attempt the run for Mayor of N. Y. this ballot time. He believes that Cong. Herman Badillo would also lose if he tried...Is the Black Caucus about to lose Howard Robinson its exec. dir? Also heard that a number of the group's former backers are backing away from the body. Seems there are too many ego trips going in individual directions...STAY LOOSE.
