

Lunches Available To All-Price Up A Nickel

Lunches will be available for purchase in all metropolitan area schools on September 6, the first day of classes for the new school year. In most schools, the lunch will be a balanced sandwich meal in September, but by the close of school next June, every school should be serving hot meals prepared in the Clark County School District's central kitchen and cooked in convection ovens at the school.

Prices are up a nickel this year on all lunches. Students in elementary schools will pay 45¢, while the non-subsidized adult meal will be 60¢.

Director of Food Services Orra Westover blamed rising food costs for the increase in the price of the meal. "Like the average housewife, we too are experiencing higher prices for meat and other staples," he said.

Meals will be provided free to all students who qualify under guidelines set by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, and eligibility forms have been mailed to all parents. Additional forms are available in all schools.

Eligibility is based on total family income and the number of members in the family. A family of four qualifies if total family income is less than \$4,110, for instance. For a family of six, annual income can go up to \$5,330.

Hot lunch service will be added to schools gradually throughout the year as the necessary convection and microwave ovens, roll-in freezers and coolers, serving equipment can be delivered and installed.
