INSIDE VEGAS--Mrs. Gil Schwartz of the Las Vegas Junior League and Roosevelt Fitzgerald, lecturer in ethnic studies at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas, discuss their roles in the upcoming class called "Inside Las Vegas" starting Wednesday (Sept. 20) at UNLV. INTEGRATION: FAMILY TRANSPORTATION

May parents transport their children to school, rather than having them ride the bus under the integration program?

Of course they can.

The school district provides bus transportation as a convenience to all students living two or more miles from their assigned school, and for all students being rezoned to achieve elementary school integration as ordered by Federal Judge Bruce R. Thompson.

But there is no rule anywhere requiring those children to ride the bus. Parents who prefer to transport their children in the family car are welcome to do so.

Parents are also free to claim children at school for dental and doctor appointments and other emergencies, and when the child becomes ill at school, just as they have in past years. Under a long-standing policy of the school district, however, children must clear the campus through the principal's office, so the principal can make sure that the child is being released to the right adult.

"WIN PROGRAM"

CARSON CITY--Persons seeking help through the Work Incentive (WIN) program are not forced to sign a medical record form designed to protect them by indicating their physical and emotional ability to work.

Director Robert Archie of the Nevada Employment Security Department reaffirmed department policy in answer to "false charges which may have been the effect of discouraging people trying to get off welfare rolls and into jobs."

The charges were carried in an "open letter" in the Las Vegas Voice in its Sept. 7 edition and signed by Ruby Duncan, president of Clark County Welfare Rights.

She claimed signing the form is an invasion of privacy and unconstitutional.

Archie, however, again stressed signing the form is voluntary and is offered as protection to clients who are unable to work.

"The form is a protective device, pure and simple," said Archie. "to afford professional (See WIN, page 3)
