AN OPEN LETTER TO MY FELLOW CITIZENS OF THE WEST LAS VEGAS COMMUNITY

On Tuesday, September 5, 1972, I attended a meeting at the Pan-Afro Auditorium to discuss and offer solutions to the problems caused by the "Bus-Out" forced school delay.

At that time, I was impressed with the size of the group attending the meeting and the interest and enthusiam that seemed to be present. Many statements and suggestions were made at that time, and -- as usual, the NAACP was be-rated for "failing to do its part." I, along with other NAACP representatives, sat and listened to the put down because I did not want to waste precious time in listing the many things of value the NAACP has accomplished for Black people, so I silently suffered through the unkind remarks.

No one seemed to recall that it was the NAACP who first came forward to oppose the inferior educational training and facilities for Blacks, or the fact that the NAACP called on Westside residents in August, 1971, for assistance and support in this fight for better education and more equitable and fair treatment for Black children. True to form, the residents of the community, who had the most to benefit, failed to come forth, and the NAACP proceeded to carry the load alone, doing the best job possible.

Yesterday, September 12, 1972, the community citizens were called on once again by the NAACP to lend a helping hand. Again, you still did not help us to fight this long, hard and tedious battle to make things better for your children than they were for you. All that we had to do was to make an appearance in Judge Christensen's court to indicate that we wanted consideration and better treatment for our children, but you would not even do that.

Out of approximately 1500 people attending the hearing last night, there were less than 100 Blacks. In a political atmosphere such as the one we survive under in Las Vegas, this small showing of people will not get the job done that we want! If we want something, we've got to stand up and be counted!

You may rest assured that the "Bus-Out" people and other similar groups are not sitting back waiting for some organization to fight the battle alone for them. They are working hand in hand with the organization and each other. If we are not careful, that handful of people will decide the destiny of our children. If we don't take a stand, we may be sure that they will and they will have their demands carried out.
