We would be foolish to give unasked OUR MOST PRIZED POSSESSION - OUR VOTE!



REMEMBERING MEDGAR EVERS

Medgar Evers was a quiet, unassuming man who avoided the glare of publicity. Yet his character was unforgettable. Fearless without bravado, he was devoted to organizing blacks in a forbidding hate-impelled state that systematically snuffed out any potential of black leadership. When he died by an assassin's bullet ten years ago this June 12, Evers and a handful of home-grown activists had already set in motion a movement that was to have a transforming influence on the political land-scape of the South and particularly, Mississip-

Evers succeeded because his faith was firmly rooted in principle. Although having experienced from birth the ugliness of race hatred and having witnessed mindless, officially-sanctioned brutality, Evers pressed ahead, nourished by a belief in integration, civil rights, the ultimate importance of the vote, and the moral as well as the strategic necessity of non-violence.
