Exactly III students at Twin Lakes Elementary have made it to the Honesty Homor Roll this year by turning into the office everything from a penny to a \$10.00 bill in a project designed to stress basic honesty to students.

Principal Jim Becker claims the entire student body would be on that honor roll "if they could only find something to turn in." In addition to money, watches, jewelry and purses have been turned in.

Every student who turns in valuables at the school office is honored for doing the right thing, according to Becker, and this practical exercise is followed up by discussions of basic honesty in classrooms.

The largest "find" was a \$10.00 bill, turned in by Steve Guinn. As it turned out, the \$10.00 was the property of an employee of the school whose husband was temporarily unemployed, and the money represented groceries for the family

for the coming week.

Becker said another student was so anxious to make the honesty roll that he begged a dollar from his father so he could make the list.

The program is an extension of a cleanup campaign begun last year and still continuing. Like the honesty program, the cleanup campaign honors those students who do the most to keep the campus clean. Litter is very hard to find at Twin Lakes.

"Honesty, cleanliness and respect for others are basic concepts that must be taught by the home and the school, " according to Becker. 'We think we are accomplishing our objectives with these programs that give reinforcement to students who do the right thing.

As for gaming employees, perhaps its raking in all those heavy winnings that causes their troubles. And light transportation workers are always lifting things.

So if you work in any of the above occupations -watch out for strains and sprains! It's your

occupational hazard!
