adult supervision is not present.

4. The pool bottom should slope gradually, with a float line to separate the shallow and deep ends. Ladders or recessed step holes should be at each


5. For emergencies, keep a floatable "shep-herd's crook" at hand so even a non-swimmer could pull a distressed swimmer to safety. Post emergency telephone numbers by gate.

6. Small portable pools should be dumped after each use or effectively barricaded.

7. When staying at a motel, see that the pool is enclosed with a protective fence that discourages climbing and a gate that is locked at night and at times not designated for use. Wherevæ

Wherever you swim, teach your children to swim early and to follow good pool conduct: Al-ways walk, never run on the deck. Refrain from horseplay, pushing ducking and false cries of alarm. Stay in shallow water if not a competent swimmer. Never swim alone. Avoid displays of strength or endurance.

By making sure the pools your kids use are kidproof and doing your best to see that the kids who use them are supervised and safety conscious, you may help to stop the annual procession of one-way trips into the water. Pools are meant, after all, for fun and good health.

REVIEW NEARING COMPLETION

Nearly one month ago the Committe on Public Health and Safety began it's review of the Clark County Medical Consultant Program- the public program which treats "hyperactive" children with stimulant drugs such as Ritalin. The aim of the review was the thorough investigation of "items of concern" the Committee had outlined in it's original report released last fall and recommendations for upgrading of the program. LACK OF PHYSICALS

Committee members surveyed school nurses, psychologists, and other individuals involved directly with the program to get first hand

The major complaint which emerged was the lack of physcial examinations for children before being placed on medication. Other complaints included overuse of medication and the use of medication to remedy "behavior pro-blems" rather than learning disabilities. The criteria used in delineating "hyperkinesis" were found to be quite diverse.

Many of those interviewed felt the program had definite positive points especially when extreme cases of "hyperkinesis were involved. M.D.'s OPINIONS

Currently a survey of medical doctors including pediatricians as well as general practitioners is being done to obtain qualified opinions regarding the program from a medical viewpoint.

The results of the review will be forwarded to the Comprehensive Health Planning department in Carson City as well as to the Food and Drug Administration in Washington.

ceived based on population while the annex-

ation areas were part of the city.

Although some councilmen expressed the desire to use the revenue sharing funds for city capital improvement projects, Weiss said this money must be applied to the general fund

to balance the budget.
WEISS SUGGESTED offsetting the losses with

\$410,269 of the revenue sharing funds.

The remaining \$516,398 balance of revenue sharing funds to be received by the city, Weiss proposed to budget as a contingency fund to replace operating monies if the three other cities win in their litigations.
WITH RELUCTANCE on the part of some

councilmen, the body voted 4 to 1 to appropriate \$253,218 to the city's general fund to offset immediate tax loses due to the annex-

ations.

The \$253,218 in revenue sharing funds are those funds received by the city from Jan. 1 to June 30 this year.

According to Weiss the revenue sharing funds were distributed to general fund line items based on the prior budgeted percentages.

The breakdown of percentages is as follows: --POLICE DEPARTMENT, 46.96 percent for \$118,911.

--Public pound, 2.01 Percent for \$5,090.
--Fire Department, 19.88 per cent for \$50,340.

--Streets, 14.14 per cent for \$35,805. --Traffic, 5.70 per cent for \$14,433. --Parks, 7.12 per cent for \$18,129.

--And library, 4.19 per cent for \$10,610. Weiss told the councilmen the city's \$6,842,966 general fund budget, as a result of annexation loses, does not contemplate the hiring of any additional personnel, but does allow for a five

per cent increase to cover inflation.

COUNCILMAN WENDELL Waite, casting the opposing vote, said he is apprehensive about setting a precedent by using revenue sharing funds for the city's general fund then getting the revenue sharing funds cut off and being in the same position as before they were received.

Councilman James Seastrand, reluctantly voting for the Weiss proposal, urged City Manager Clay Lynch to provide other alternatives to offset the budget losses.

BUT LYNCH responded that the only other alternative was to cut city operations.

He additionally noted the city's financial position could be further hindered as the result of binding arbitration which the city's police and firemen are currently undergoing.

But Councilman Dan Gray said he favors maintaining "sound fiscal policy."

"I'm glad the city has the windfall of revenue sharing funds for the budget. Hopefully we won't need any additional personnel next year and the annexation case will turn out for the city," Gray said.

MAYOR BUD Cleland questioned Lynch as to why the city could afford to pay non-uniform city employees the settled five per cent pay increase since the budget faces a deficit.

Lynch told the council he didn't say the city could afford the increase, but "the employees deserve it because of the cost of living increase."
