

Dr. Carlton B. Goodlett **Elected Head Of NNPA**

WASHINGTON (NNPA) -- Dr. Carlton B. Goodlett, editor and publisher of the San Fran-cisco Sun Reporter since 1948, a psychologist a medical doctor, and civil rights activist, has been elected president of the National Newspaper Publishers Association (NNPA). The election took place recently at the 33rd Annual Convention of the association in Houston, Terms He has served as NNPA vice president

Texas. He has served as NNPA vice president since 1971.

Others elected during the convention were: Howard B. Woods, editor-publisher of the St. Louis Sentinel, vice president; Mrs. Lenora Carter, publisher of the Houston Forward Times, re-elected secretary; and Howard H. Murphy, comptroller of the Afro-American Newspapers,

re-elected treasurer. The newly elected board members are: Earl Davis, Jr., editor-publishers, San Diego Voice & Viewpoint News; Longworth M. Quin, editorwheepoint News; Longworth M. Quinn, editor-publisher, Michigan Chronicle; Robert J. Tho-mas, editor-publisher of the Milwaukee Star-Times; and Garth C. Reeves, Sr., editor-pub-lisher, Miami Times, and immediate past-president of NNPA. There are 15 members of the board, including the officers.

Dr. Goodlett, a longtime activist in civil rights, African development, and world peace, is establishing with the NNPA board an agenda for promoting these efforts through the Black Press, as well as further strengthening the Black Press itself.

The new NNPA head was born in Chipley, Fla., reared in Omaha, and educated at Howard University, the University of California at which he earned a Ph.D. in psychology, and Meharry Medical College. It was after a year of teaching at West Virginia State College that he entered medical school. He has been practicing since 1945. His son Garry is now studying medicine at Meharry.

WASHINGTON, D.C. America's only Black State Supreme Court Justice, the president of America's largest Black business, America's America's largest Black business, America's most successful youngest Black magazine pub-lisher, and a world renowned Black research bacteriologist will be among the array of distinguished talent scheduled to appear at the 55th Annual Conclave of Omega Psi Phi Fra-ternity in St. Louis from July 31 to August 5. Other nationally famous Black members of Omega to appear will be the assistant legal coun-sel for General Motors, a Black former presi-

sel for General Motors, a Black former president of a newspaper association and the presi-dent of a southern college. The conclave theme for the 62 year old Black college fraternity will be "Reassessment

Of Goals For Black Americans In A Democracy.

Highlights of the St. Louis meeting will be three major panels including America's most influential Blacks. The panel on Social Welfare will feature Dr. Hildras A. Poindexter, Howard University medical faculty member and world known medical researcher; Robert N.C.Nix, Jr., America's only Black State Supreme Court Justice and Dr. Jerome Gresham, president of Barber Scotia College in Concord, N.C.

The panel on Business will include Otis M. Smith, assistant legal counsel for General Motors; Milton Johnson, an executive and a buyer for the J.C. Penney Company and William J. Kennedy, III, president of North Carolina Mutual Insurance Company of Durham.

The panel on Communications will include Earl Graves, publisher of the new and sky-rocketing business publication known as Black Enterprise and Garth Reeves, editor and pub-lisher of the Miami Times and former president of the National Newspaper Publishers Association.

According to James Avery, Grand Basileus of Omega Psi Phi, and an executive with Exxon, the fraternity will have a record turn out this year in St. Louis and some of the usually secret awards from Omega will be the most exciting

in the fraternity's history. Speaking in Washington about the 55th Annual Conclave, Harold Cook, the new executive director of Omega Psi Phi, said that reservations are constantly pouring in to the extent that a second hotel may be used to accomodate the thousands of Omega men, their families and friends.

NOTICE TO STUDENTS

WASHINGTON--Students who need money for their education after high school may now apply for Basic Educational Opportunity Grants, ac-cording to Nevada Senator Alan Bible.

More than \$122 million is available nationwide under this new program administered by HEW's

Office of Education. "Although limited this year to first-year, fullme postsecondary students, the program is expected to benefit an estimated one-half million students who might otherwise be unable to continue their education." Bible said. "Along with other Federal programs of student financial aid, it marks significant progress toward the Congress' ultimate goal of making postsecondary education available to all young people who desire it."

Under the Basic Grant program, students in financial need may obtain funds to help pay their educational expenses at any approved college, (see HEW, page 9)
