Disability Benefits For Blind

WASHINGTON--Senator Alan Bible, D-Nev., has co-sponsored legislation to provide expanded disability benefits for the blind.

Under present law, a blind person must work five of the ten years prior to the time he applies for disability insurance payments in order to establish eligibility for such Social Security benefits.

The bill sponsored by Bible would make the blind eligible for benefits after they had been employed for a year and a half in Social Security-covered jobs.

The Nevada senator said that after working the year and a half, the blind person will be allowed to continue to draw disability insurance payments as long as they remain blind, regardless of their earnings.

"Reducing the required employment period is much more realistic and reasonable than the present law."

Bible said that the bill gives legal recognition to another hard fact confronting the blind--they must always function without sight in a society structured for sight.

The legislation will help to off-set the economic consequences of blindness such as diminished employment opportunities, greatly increased cost of living and working in a sight-directed economy and society.

Towell Bill To Check On The Checker

WASHINGTON--Congressman David Towell has co-sponsored legislation which calls for the General Accounting Office to conduct complete audits of major government agencies which are not now audited.

These agencies include the Internal Revenue Service, the Federal Reserve System, the Comptroller of the Currency and the Office of Alien Property.

Towell pointed out that the GAO, as the investigative arm of Congress, can check to see whether expenditures are reasonable. He noted that the IRS has a budget of more than \$945 million--the highest expenditure of any unaudited agency.

"I'm not saying that anything is wrong," Towell explained, "but I'm supporting this legislation because I believe that these agencies should be accountable to the public and Congress, just as other federal agencies are."

Women's Credit Rights Legislative Sponsored

WASHINGTON--Congressman David Towell has co-sponsored legislation which would guarantee equal credit rights for women.

Towell explained that the bill establishes the ability to pay as the only requirement for granting credit and does not force businesses to take on bad risks.

"Women who are financially responsible," Towell said, "should no longer have to fight against the prejudices of a bygone era."

The Nevada legislator noted that there is ample evidence which clearly shows that single women have more trouble in obtaining credit than single men, regardless of income. He said married women also are affected because creditors often refuse to approve credit in the wife's name.

"This outmoded attitude simply does not take into account the fact that women comprise nearly 40 percent of the labor force and head 10 percent of the households," Towell stated. "This bill would put them on an equal footing."
