ANSWERS TO QUESTIONS PARENTS **ASK ABOUT OPENING OF SCHOOL**

Q. I am a new resident; whom should I contact as to what school my youngsters will attend? A. School Facilities Department, Clark County

School District, 736-5250.

What if I am unable to register my children on the registration dates of August 30 & 31 or September 4?

Contact your individual school directly; offices have been open full-time since Aug-

ust 13.

Q. What is the entrance age for kindergarten;

for first grade?

A. For kindergarten, a child must be 5 years old by September 30, 1973; for first grade, he must be 6 years old by October 31, 1973. What types of information are available by

contacting the individual school?

A. School hours, procedures to follow in case of absence for any reason, homework, reporting to parents (reportcards), courses of study, lunch arrangements, riding bicycles to schools, safest routes to school, etc.

Q. What is the first full day of school? A. Wednesday, September 5 except for kindergarten children (details on this program will be explained by the individual school).

Q. If I do not have the school telephone number, whom may I call? A. Consult information (113) or District office

(736-5011) for listings.

Q. Who qualifies for bus transportation? A. By Board of Trustees policy, students living more than two miles from school are eligible for bus transportation. Particulars may be obtained from the Transportation Department, 876-1226.

Q. Are applications still being accepted for the Southern Nevada Vocational-Technical Cen-

A. Yes, in several subjects. Telephone 451-1088 for particulars.

Q. Will adults be accepted into any of the programs to be offered at SNVTC?

Yes, contact the registrar or counselors (451-1088) for day-time classes.

Will District bus transportation be provided for those students attending SNVTC?

Q. Will SNVTC offer academic as well as vocational subjects?

Yes, since most prospective employers require a high school diploma as well as other training.

Q. What is the current status of educational television (ETV) in Clark County?

Full programs on instructional television (daytime) and educational television (evening) are planned.

Q. How long is the school day for kindergarten? A. Two hours of actual instruction time is the

minimum day. Q. Will any schools be on short-day sessions?

Q. What records are needed for children attend-

ing school in Clark County for the first time? Kindergarten and first grade pupils must present a birth certificate or other acceptable proof of date of birth. Other pupils are requested to have reports of work previously completed and promotion to the new grade, or high school credit earned. Your previous school can supply these records upon request.

Q. How often are report cards issued? A. Kindergarten report cards are issued on a

twelve-week basis. Report cards for grades one through twelve are issued every nine weeks. Before the end of the fifth week of the nine-week period, teachers are required to send notices to parents advising them of unsatisfactory or failing work.

Q. Is there a charge for textbooks and supplies? A. By state law textbooks and supplies are furnished free. In junior and senior high schools, students will be expected to furnish certain

supplies.

Is student accident insurance available through the schools?

A. Yes, at nominal costs, children can be insured for the year. Details will be made available to parents at registration time.

Q. Are health certificates required? A. First and second grade students, by state law, must have a series of inoculations. Forms are available to show compliance with this law.

Q. What shall I do if we move to another school zone after school begins?

A. Notify your child's school at least a day ahead of time, if possible. Get a transfer form from the old school and bring it to the new

PROPERTY TAX,

Nevadans said, "We're pushing the September 4 deadline for filing and it appears the surface isn't even scratched. We've got to hear from our elderly citizens before we can get them tax relief. That relief is more critical now than ever." O'Callaghan added, "because the fixed incomes of elderly citizens are threatened even more by the pressure of newly accelerated prices."

Nevadans aged 65 and older can apply for the tax relief at any county assessor's office or branches of the State Tax Commission or by writing the commission in Carson City.

O'Callaghan said it is normal for wrinkles to be ironed out of some new laws. "In drafting this law," he explained, "it could not be determined what number of older Nevadans have extremely low incomes, because Nevada doesn't have a state income tax on which that determination could be made. But there was no question there should be an easing of property taxes levied against our senior citizens.'

CONGRESSMAN TOWELL

DATELINE LAS VEGAS--Congressman David Towell tonight told members of the Fraternal Order of Police conventioning in Las Vegas that they can expect the Congress to adopt a number of new laws affecting law enforcement in Ameri-

Towell, told the 3,000 police delegates that this fall the House of Representatives will seriously consider the number of changes that will immediately affect the working conditions

if the police officers throughout this country. Towell said the House will give serious consideration to federal legislation that provides benefits to survivors of public safety officers killed in the performance of duty.

The Nevada Gongressman said a provision providing \$50,000 to eligible dependents passed the Senate earlier this year and will be the subject of committee hearings in the House in September.

Nevada's only Congressman said he will sup-

port it if it comes to the House floor.

Towell said compensations for the victims of crimes is also scheduled for serious consideration in the House this fall.

The provisions under study would make grants to the individual states for payments to persons insured by certain criminal acts. Payments to establish a nationwide federally subsidized insurance program for state and local public safety officers including firefighters and prison officers is also scheduled to get close attention in the House of Representative, Towell said.
